## Slipshod Management.

Whoever is responsible for the management of Town Fire matters ought to make an effort to have the fire bell rung and the Electric Station whistle blown according to the printed directions in regard to fire alarms. When the alarm was given on Wednesday evening of last week for the little fire at the residence of Mr. W. C. Winslow, it did not indicate which of the wards it was in, until after the bell had been clanging for some time. Then, an attempt was made to ring it properly two or three times, but there was hardly any appreciable pause after the two strokes indicating the locality of the fire until the next two were made. In less than a minute there was a return to the excited and indefinite style of

ringing. When the Electric station whistle was blown there was the same want of attention to the rule for fire alarms.

There is no excuse for such evident lack of order or discipline. It indicates a sloven liness and absence of proper instruction in the fire service and ought to be remedied. Surely there is some man at the council board capable of seeing that a reform shall be effected in this and some other matters which are allowed to drift as they will. It is of a piece with the neglect of snow plowing on the streets after the storm of last week and of inattention to several minor town interests which are neglected, to say nothing of the manifest incompetency of the council to deal with our much needed water and sewerage system. Thoughtful citizens who wish to see Chatham moving along on modern lines of development, as it ought to do, are discouraged over the manifest fact that its town council lacks the capacity for the work it should be doing, and there does not seem to be any disposition on the part of the majority of the ratepayers to improve its

The bye-law muddle is another evidence of the ability of the council to discharge the duties it has undertaken. It is a fact that there is no code of bye-laws for the town which could be used in any court if the matter were tested. The old ones have been patched and added to, half revised and muddled in such a way as to make them a nightmare in their line. Then, an attempt was made to revise them and the revision was a carelessly made one. It has been printed and the printer was obliged to correct some glaring errors in the copy as the proofs were being read. Then, it was proposed to pass them as printed, when it was discovered that the rule requiring notice of at least a month for the repeal of the old code, in order to have the new one passed, had not been given, so the whole matter has gone over for at least two months, as notice to deal with the subject was not given on Monday night, for the chairman of the Bye-law Committee did not appear to have much knowledge of the newly revised and printed code. If someone don't tie the council down to something by which it can be held to its work it will be entirely swamped and the town with it, for it is now helplessly adrift. The way in which the council members endeavored to get out of this muddle yesterday by having the printer of the new bye-laws attacked in the World will not help them in the least.
