BANK OF MONTREAL :- A Montreal despatch says that the half yearly statement of the Bank of Montreal has been issued, showing profits for the period, after making provision for all bad and doubtful debts, of \$682,903, compared with \$658,161 for the same period last year, an increase of \$24,742 A dividend of \$600,000 will be payable December 1.


