ARROW ESCAPE OF THREE SKATERS FROM DROWNING AT UPPER CHATHAM. Last Friday night while skating on the iver below Lynch's mill on the Nelson side of the river Jas. McFarlane and Jack Mc-Combes, broke through the thin ice. Robert McCombes, who was a little in the rear at once rushed to the rescue and skating to the edge of the broken ice took off his overcoat and lying flat on the ice threw it out to his companious in the water and tole them to hold on, but the current had carried them to the lower edge of the hole, which was quite large and they could not reach the coat. In endeavoring to back away from the hole and as the ice was very thin Robt. McCombes struck the toe of his skate in the ice but this broke off a large and he also went in head foremost. Their cries had attracted a number of fishermen who brought a pole and rope with them and the two McCombes were pulled out without much difficulty but McFarlane was so benumbed that he could not hold on to the rope which was thrown to him. L. Coughlan who saw the difficulty told him to put it in his mouth and to hold on with his teeth. This he did but the current was so etrong that the lower half of his body was carried under the ice and he could not be pulled up. By this time the onlookers saw that unless something was speedily done they would be the witnesses of a sad catastrophe, so L. Coughlan laid down on the ice Frank Masson caught his feet and then they worked out over the thin ice to crossed to the S.
