

knees. Just beyond the opposite bank, a bogan or creek intercepted us from reaching the mainland. This we had great d fficulty in crossing, as the surface was partly covered by decayed trees. He e Walter fell very heavily, and experienced great difficulty in regaining his feet. We then followed along the bank of the river to the main portage, and proceeded.


