### Treat all Alike.

Alderman Nicol, while generally appearing to be desirous of conducting public business safely, sometimes makes bad breaks in that respect. An instance occurred on Monday evening at the Council meeting, when he advocated the principle of tavoritism in the management of the newly acquired electric light system, by practically proposing that applications should be entertained from persons desirons of being supplied with single light, at a flat rate. It to be hoped that no such deficit-creating notions will be entertained. Let the metre system be rigidly adhered to, so that everybody will be required to pay for the light they use, as all good citizens ought to be willing to do. The flat rate, single light system is a wasteful one, and if the Town Council is weak enough to countenance it, the investment made in purchasing the Electric Light Company out will be a losing, instead of a paying one. If the present were a good time to sell debentures we would prefer to raise the money at once in that way, but, as it is not, we are anxious to make as good a temporary loan as
