The cause of Mr. Sinclair's death was at aff-ction of the brain, and although it only began to develop about two months ago, it was soon apparent to the medical men that it would be fatal. He went, as soon as it manifested itself, to Montreal, accompanied by his son-in-law, Dr. Ferguson, and Mr. John Ferguson, and they consulted eminent specialists. He intended, after a short rest at home, to seek further aid in New York. but the trouble became acute and neither the solic tude of the family, nor medical skill could avert the result which the whole

community so deeply deplores.

Mr. Sinclair was so greatly beloved by those to whom he had been a benefactor. that when it was understood that his malady was a necessarily fatal one, it was not unusual to hear of some of them expressing the wish that they could take his place and go, so that he might remain to do more good to his fellow-creatures; and when it was known that he was indeed dead, the genuine expressions of sorrow and regret manifested by all classes were the community's testinonial to the high place he held in its regard ; for his largeness of heart consisted not only in his disposition to help his fellowcrea ures in material things, but in the display of a generous spirit and geni.l at ributes, which were the underlying im pulses of his character, and won for him the personal fre dship of al who knew him. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon and was under the direction of Mr. R. L. Malby.
