THEY SMOKE HUGE CIGARS.

A curious fact noticeable in the Philippines is that the women smoke enormous cigars, while the men smoke only cigarettes. These cigars are sixteen inches long, and five inches in circumference, and constitute one week's pleasure for the ladies. The weight of such a cigar is necessarily considerable, and to offset this a mouthpiece consisting of a soft fibre of tobacco is made at one end, so that when firmly grasped in the teeth an indentation is made which for the remainder of the six days smoke, fits naturally to the teeth.
