Good pineapples of this kind can often be purchased in the middle of summer for \$1 a dozen, and they are so sweet they do not require much sugcanned fruit may be satisfactorily prepared from pineapples. A delicious preserve of pineapples is made of this fruit cut in cubes and left in a cool place over night in threequarters its weight of sugar. In the morning the juice of the fruit will cover it. 

Preserve all the strawberries that you are to put up in their own weight or three-quarters of their weight of sugar. They will usually require this amount of sugar to be agreeable to the taste on the table. The amount of sugar used depends on the acidity of the berries.
