been fairly satisfactory, although not so much so as that of the year before, owing to the advanced price of coal and increased outat lay for maintenance of steamers.


The want of proper facilities for landing at Bay da Vin was a great drawback to business at that important point, while delay in constructing the Loggieville wharf was also unsatisfactory.

The president also read correspondence in reference to a steamer which was offered to the company through Messrs Carriere, Laine & Co., of Quebec, and which it was thought would be very suitable to replace the Miramichi on the down-river route. He said that Mr M S Hocken and himself, accompanied by Mr J M Ruddock, went to Monreal and examined this boat and Mr Ruddock had made a report upon her. This the president read to the meeting, and while it showel that she was all right in model and general arrangement of houses etc, and had good engine, boiler and speed, her construction was so cheap and defective as to make her unfit for the service down river.

It was decided not to purchase this vessel, but the directors were instructed to forthwith obtain a model and plans and estimates for a suitable boat for the down-river route and its possible extension to P E Island, and to submit same to a special general meeting of the company to be called by the president at as early a date as possible

The president and Mr W C Winslow were appointed a committee to act with a committee of the Board of Trade for the purpose of endeavoring to secure from the Dominion Government a modification or enlargement of the plans of the wharf at Bay du Vin, the immediate construction of the Loggieville wharf and other improvements in landing facilities for the company's down-river

The need of repairs to Bushville wharf was also urged and the matter referred to the same committee.
