

Well Done New York!

All good citizens who are familiar with the condition of affairs in the city of New York and with the corruption which has prevailed for years in connection with its government, will be glad to hear that in the election for Mayor and other officials of the great corporation held on Tuesday, the power of Tammany was broken and its candidates defeated, Seth Low the fusionist candidate for Mayor winning.

Mr. Low. defeated Edwd. Shepard, the democratic candidate, by a plurality of from 30,000 to 40,000 in the Dominion. votes. Tamniany's ex-Mayor, Van Wyck, and other democrats who ran for Justices of the Supreme Court were defeated, as was also its candidate for the District Attorneyship. In fact, there has been almost a clean sweep made of the Tammany men. "Boss" Croker of Tammany has resigned his long and evil leadership in view of the result. It was a great day for New York and for reform.

#### Bestir Yourselves, Gentlemen!

The outlook for Chatham's householders having the water and sewerage pipes connected with their premises, so that they may avail themselves of those services as soon as the water turned on the town mains, is not a satisfactory one. It is only now that applications made months ago, for house connections are being attended

Cellars will have to be entered with both water and sewer connections, and it cannot be done in the cold weather of December and later without letting frost in, and our townspeople know the discomfort and loss that will be involved in that. Danger of freezing in the water service pipes before they can be properly protected by back-filling will also be incurred, and necessary plumbing delayed. ling houses, 1,000 policy shops, 700 dis-

Many persons who, under more prompt action would, take the water from the start, will probably have to defer doing so until next summer and perhaps longer, rather than incur the risks involved in putting in the service pipes in winter, and this will entail a loss of revenue, which the town can ill afford, and for which past dilatoriness will be directly responsible.

#### [Communicated.] The Ontario and the Maritime Provincial Winter Fairs

The Ontario Provincial Winter Fair was for many years conducted by the Agricultural and Arts Association.
