The newspapers of the Maritime provinces are constantly receiving offers which show the necessity for shutting down on the cormorants who go to advertisers having large lines of business to place and by pretending to have more or less control o the business of certain groups of papers secure contracts covering them. Then, they make offers to the papers they have contracted for at a fract on of honest rates, informing them that they have, after a great struggle, induced the advertisers to give their papers a trial, but

rates must be low, that acceptance will lead to increased future business, etc. etc. Most publishers decline such offers, but there must be some acceptances or that style of advertising agent could not continue to do business.

For so ne time there has been a form of preying upon publishers by the advertising agency harpies that illustrates their impudent methods. They have no capital or credit, but they offer business at the usual ridiculously low rates, with payment in "job display typs," ink, etc-all at list prices, while they require a commission of twenty five per cent. to be deducted from the price offered for the work proposed. Austra ian Statements Concerning Strathcona's Horse

The Melbourne Outpost which has been publishing some opinions on the war collected from Australians says that of all the men fighting on the side of the British, the Australians, give the palm to Strathcona's Horse, the Canadian R giment, for all-round "toughness" and pitilessness.

During the fighting Strathcona's Horse, they allege, never gave quarter unless the presence of an officer compelled them to, and it was their invariable custom to take revenge on any shots from a supposed friendly farmhouse by stringing up all the male adults of the place and shooting into the dangling bodies in true wild west

Strathcona's Horse got even too strong for the military authorities in Cape Town, and in a tour of the fashionable bars of the town they riddled every electric light bulb, in some instances smashing up bottles on the shelves by the same means. An orderly, sent to demand order by some big gun, was sown up in a sack and thrown into a drain, and a threat was made by the members of the Horse to throw the official who made the order after him.

Owing to the frolics of Strathcona's Horse the Australians were not allowed out of the barracks at Cape Town, until the day of sailing, it being feared that the losses in killed and wounded might be greater than they had been at the front.

Altogether the Canadians had the most fervent send off that Cape Town accorded to any body of troops. Old inhabitints said they would sooner see a dezen impis of Zulus in possession of the place than experience another week of Strathcona's Horse.

Sydney Steel Works in a Combine.

Morgan, o New York, has been working for some time, and which includes nearly all the large steel works in the United States, has just added another plant to the mammoth consolidation. For some days Thos. E. Ryau, a prominent New York lawyer, has been at Sydney, B., looking over the works of the ominion Iron and Steel Company, which started operations only a couple of weeks ago. On Saturday afternoon the deal was consummated by which the Morgan steel trust takes control of the works at Sylney.
