Robbing the Mooney Pulp Mill.

TALKS OF ROBBERY AND MURDER IN THE

[St. John Globe, Feb. 22.] There was a big attendance at the Police Court today, the space outside the rail being filled to an uncomfortable degree. There were not many cases, but the two set down for hearing proved interesting, the Lord case especially, in which there was some sensational testimony.

The charge against Merritt Lord, of Carleton, was the theft of several brass and copper valves and pieces of piping from the Mispec Pulp Mill. Some remarkable testimony was taken, portions of it sounding almost like a chapter from a dime novel. De Silas Alward appeared for the prosecution, and Mr. J. B M. Bixter, who has successfully defended Lord on several previous occasions, appeared for the defence. The evidence of George H. White was first taken. Mr. White is Mr. Mooney's outside foreman at Mispec. He said he knew the defendant, who worked at the pulp mill last March as an oiler. He saw him at Mispec about a week ago, and spoke to him. They both boarded at McIsaac's. They carried their dinner to the mill and walked back together at night. Shown the pieces of brass stolen, the witness said he saw them at McIsaao's, in a pile in a corner of a room where Frank Daly slept. He asked Lord where the stuff came from, and Lord said "! get into trouble. Later he had another conversation with Lord in McIsaac's house. He (Lord) remarked how dead easy it was to get away with Mooney when he was coming to Mispec with the boodle to pay the men off. He said he would get behind a rock, shoot the horse, and if Mooney would not give up the money he would shoot him. The witness told him he dida't want to hear talk like that, and warned him if anything

Mr. Bexter, said he belonged to Parrsboro house, and didn't look for it, for he didn't want to make trouble for any man. He he did not do so before being asked.

Mr. Baxter asked White if he had never talked to Lord about how the bank in Maitland, N. S., could be broken into. The witness said he did talk about the bank to Lord, but it was the latter who said it was a mark, and asked him if he would go there with him and do the job. Witness said he replied that he had a family to consider and a reputation. Lord one time heard him say that there was a quarter of a million dollars in the Maitland bank. Lord remarked,

"Oh what a mark," and then suggested going there.

To Dr. Alward witness said that Lord had to Mr. Mooney. He could swear that some of the articles found in the room at Mc-Issac's were from the mill.

The next witness was Mary Jane B nnett. who lives a mile and a half beyond Mispec mill. She kept house for Mr. McIsaac. Mr. White boarded there; also Merritt Lord. They used to take their dinners in large cans to the mill, and return at night. She used to wash their dinner cans. Shown the articles found by the police, the witness said she took them out of Lord's dinner can. She thought they were of no use and put them away in the spare room.

To Mr. Baxter she said she only took stuff out of one can, and only found anything in Lord's can on one occasion. She did not know how the rest of the stuff got The Managing Committee, squared off into the spare room. She was positive that the results of their play against the ft was Merritt Lord's can that the stuff came out of.

William McIsaac testfied he was an electrician. He had a house some distance from the mill. Mrs. Bennett was his housekeeper. He worked in the mill last March as an oiler. Mr. White boarded with him and also Merritt Lord. They used to take their dinner to the mill in cans. Looking at the stolen articles, witness declared he never carried any of it away in his dinner can. The first time he saw the stuff, he spoke to Mrs. Bennet about it, and learned from her how it came to the house. Lord was out to his house off and on for the last three weeks. He was visiting witness and was not paying board. Looking at the the articles, McIsaac said some of the stuff was like what was used around the mill. He said he never saw the hammer before. The monkey wrench, he said he took it to his house to repair a bicycle. He borrowed it from the mill intending to return it. Witness did not remember ever telling officer Killen that Lord gave him the hammer. He did not invite Lord to visit him, he said. He stayed around with the children and cut

To Mr. Baxter witness said he used to be called William Stanley in Carleton. Asked to tell his version of the Maitland bank episode, he said he heard Lord and White talking one day of a bank in Maitland where there was plenty of money, and there was good chance to get into it. He heard Merritt say, "What do you say if we go?" It was White who suggested getting into it. 15 | He wrote Lord a letter telling him not to come down as his boy was sick. He did not remember ever asking him. He told him in the letter he could not leave the house, but that he knew the road, and could come himself. Regarding the stuff, he said he had not told Mr. Mooney. He intended to take the stuff back. The first he knew of Mr. Mooney looking after the stuff was on Tuesday, He was in town that day. Lord was ia Mispec the day previous. Detective Killen, he learned, had called at his house and had found the brass valves and pipes. Andrew Dewar was the next witness. He said he was pulp cook at the mill. He knew Merritt Lord, Articles similar to those shown him were used daily in the mill. The valves were two globe valves and two checks. They were good valves, discarded perhaps because the disc was worn. A few cents would put them right. He gave the value of five valves as over \$10. The other

It was on Saturday last that he first had suspicion that goods were being taken from the mill. The articles were lying about the mill in various places. Many of the valves, connections, pipings, etc., were plentiful about the mill, to replace those which work out quickly owing to the strength of the acid used. The articles were quite rare here having been made in Austria. He believed the articles produced in court belonged the mill. Such articles would not be found

in any other mill here. Last Saturday, one of his men, Matthew McLaughlin called him to one side saying You had better be careful on Saturday coming down to Mispec with the money. He asked him why; and he (McLaughlin) said "there was some talk about him being done up." He (Mooney) then made inquiries and Mr. McLaughlin said he did not want to tell. Witness said he would compel him to do it and McLaughlin said George White would tell him all about it. Mr. Mooney then called White into his office and questioned him. White said he had heard Merritt Lord talking about it. He said Merritt proposed getting behind a rock and then shooting the horse, and Mr. Mooney for the "boodle." He said it could be done dead easy. White then said, "There are other things I could tell you," and on being got that." 
