Auburn, Maine, in response to a letter which he had written them on seeing a statement that they were negotiating with the town of St. Stephen for encouragement to establish a shoe factory in that town. The company informed him that they were looking over the Maritime provinces and if sufficient inducements were offered they would establish a shoe factory in one of the towns. The plant they would set up would employ from 150 to 200 hands ;-the average wages paid in Auburn was \$2 a day, but they could not say what they would pay in Chatham. He, Ald. Murdoch, had written them saying he thought Chatham might offer a bonus and Rev. Mr. Henderson next spoke elequentthat he would bring the matter before the Town Council, He thought that if such factory were established here our own people would soon learn how to do the work in it, as they were intelligent. He had told the company that Chatham would give them as much encouragement as St. Stephen. The company would prefer a bonus to exemption from taxation. They would spend about \$3,772 a fortnight in wages. The town could only base any bonus it might give on the amount of wages to be paid.

The correspondence was referred for report to the Finance Committee.

Ald. Watt moved that the law relating to aldermanic elections be so changed as to provide that four al lermen shall be elected to represent, one each, the four wards of the town in which they shall respectively reside and other four the town at large irrespective of ward residence, and that this be one of the provisions of the bill to be sent from the town to the legislature.
