Inception of the Cunarders.

Miramichi people will be interested Mr. James A. Mason's account of the inception of the Cunard Line of steamers which appears in Cassell's Magazine for July :-When proposals for the use of steam fell th ck and fast, there were the customary men of light and leading who proved to demonstration that the thing was imposfathered upon Dr. Dionysius Lardner, at a meeting of scientific folk, held in 1835, at the Royal Institution in Liverpool: "As to the project which is announced in the newspapers of making the voyage directly from New York to Liverpool, it is, I have no nesitatson in saying, quite chimerical, and they may as well talk of making a voyage from New York or Liverpool to the moon!" Complete answer to such amusing dognatism was given in 1838, when the Leithbuilt Sirius (of 703 tons) left Liverpool for New York via Queen-town on the 4th of April: and three days later the Great Western (1,340 tons), designed by the illustrious Brunel, left Bristol for the same port. Both
