The Parks cotton mill at St. John, which is one of the big manufactories of that city. got into financial difficulties and was closed down a few months ago to the regret of everybody and loss of employment to several hundred hands. The shutting down was because of foreclosure of mortgages, amounting to \$146,000 held by the Somon Jones and W. W. Turnbull estates. A sale of the property took place the other day under an order of the Equity Court, and Mr. A. H. Hanington, representing himself and Mr. James F. Our report of the discussion at the small meeting of Chatham's ratepayers on Monday evening necessarily omits a number of points made by speakers.

Ald. Nicol scored one with the thinking persons present when he arrested ex-Mayor Winslow's vehement charges against the present council of extravagance of expenditure by crying out: "Do you mean the lawyer's bill." Of course, that was particularly hard on the lawyer, but it also caused the audience to recollect that had it not been for ald. Nicol the lawyer's bill would not have passed.

Then, it was a revelation to hear several of the speakers who were directly and inpumping engine extravagance, declare that Mr. Coffin, C. E., would state that he approved of the purchase of the Worthington pump and 66 inch boiler, in preference to the Smart-Eny pump and boiler, which latter he had officially recommended, and afterwards wrote protesting against his advice not being taken when he learned that the Worthington pump and Macdongall

was in the hall and was one of the speakers, but he did not stand by his former protest and seemed to be hypnotised by the gentlemen who spoke for him.


