Death of Mr. H. D. Peters.

The death occurred this morning after a long illness of Mr. Harry D. Peters, for many years clerk with Messrs. T. B. Barker & Sons, and later in business at Newcastle. Failing health compelled him to retire about a year ago and he has since lived in St. John. Mr. Peters was forty-two years of age and the second son of the late Dr. Harry Peters, of Gagetown. His wife, formerly Miss White, of this city, and four children survive. The deceased was well and favorably known, and a large circle of friends will hear with regret of his death. The funeral will take place on Monday from Trinity church.—Globe of Sat. March 16.

Death of Duncan C. Robertson.

Mr. Duncan C. Robertson, who resided in Chatham and did a ship-chandlery business in partnership with Mr. Geo. MacAndrew, about twenty years ago, and later went to Boston, where he held a good position with Messrs. Stetson, Cutler & Co., up to the time of his death. He died at his home in Brookline, on Wednesday last week. Mr. Robertson since leaving St. John, where he went from Chatham, manifested a kindly interest in New Brunswickers visiting Boston, particularly those of St. John and the Miramichi. He was a press writer of excellent attainments, particularly on the subjects of the drama and poetry. He was only about 50 years old at the time of his death, which was caused by pneumonia.

Cricket.

The Pre-bytery of Miramichi will hold its next quarterly meeting in St. Andrew's Church on Tuesday of next week at 10 o'clock, standard time. In connection with this meeting is to be held a public meeting on Tuesday evening, which is to take the form of a Conference on Sabbath School and Young People's Work. The public meeting will be continued on Wednesday, forenoon, afternoon and evening.

A good programme has been prepared by the Presbytery, and some of their number will give addresses and read papers on subjects of great importance to the Church. The Conference promises to become an annual institution with the Presbytery of Miramichi. Restigouche Circuit Court.

Dalhousie, March 12.—Circuit court opened here this afternoon, in absence of the train preventing the judge being present in the forenoon. There were present Chief Justice Tuck, Stenographer P. Y. and the following barristers: R. A. Lawlor, K. C., J. C. Barbois, W. A. Mott, J. S. Harquail, John Montgomery, J. P. Byrne and H. P. McLatchy. The business taken up was a chambers matter, the presentation of a petition for the appointment of a permanent liquidator of The David Inglis Co., Ltd.

Oswald Smith was appointed. H. P. McLatchy for petitioner and John Montgomery for other creditors.

The grand jury found a true bill against Thos. Beckingham for an assault upon his wife. Beckingham pleaded guilty and was remanded for sentence.

Dalhousie, March 13.—Today Chief Justice Tuck imposed a fine of \$10 upon Thos. Beckingham. Beckingham paid the fine and was discharged. R. A. Lawlor, K. C., for the crown, W. A. Mott and J. C. Barbois for prisoner.

Hines v. Calligan again came before the court for adjournment of trial. The application was withdrawn and on behalf of defendant another application made to amend plea. The application to amend was allowed, the cause to go over to next circuit, the defendant to pay plaintiff the costs of the day. John Montgomery and J. P. Byrne for plaintiff, J. C. Barbois and H. P. McLatchy for defendant.

The case of Gillis v. Cooling, an action for judgment, was tried by the judge without a jury, and he found for plaintiff, W. A. Mott for plaintiff and John Montgomery for defendant. Court adjourned.

St. Patrick's Day.

Monday was practically a holiday in Chatham, being observed in a week day in commemoration of Ireland's patron saint, the anniversary of whose supposed birthday was Sunday. "The wearing of the green" was noticeable everywhere, and everybody seemed to be in sympathy with the occasion. St. Michael's Band paraded the streets in the forenoon and afternoon in their big sleigh, Ald. Maher being with them and having led him the veteran Irishman, Mr. Patrick Kirby, who is in his 94th year, and is so favorably known to everybody on the Miramichi. A procession of sleighs followed the band and many leading citizens were in it.

Following its usual custom, St. Michael's C. T. A. Society gave matinee and evening dramatic performances in the Masonic hall, both of which were to crowded audiences. The chief feature of both was the Irish drama, "The Rebel of '98." It was played by members of the Society, the cast being as follows:—

Mr. T. Kain deserves much credit as stage manager as well as actor and the scenery, specially painted by Capt. John Bullock was highly admired.

The after piece "The Darkey Tragedian" was played by Messrs. P. Desmond, J. J. Leahy and J. S. Martin who acquitted themselves admirably.

Fallen Heroes. THEIR GRAVES IN SOUTH AFRICA TO BE IDENTIFIED AND DECORATED.

AN APPEAL FOR CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THIS PURPOSE.

In March of last year the Executive of the Daughters of the Empire determined upon assuming the care of the graves of our soldiers in South Africa. Three reasons seemed to press this work upon us. The first was that by its constitution, the Federation is pledged to cherish the last resting places of our Heroes and Heroines, especially such as are in distant soil.

With this object in view we wrote to the ladies of Cape Town, asking them to cooperate with us in our effort, first to locate the graves and then take them under our permanent care. To this request our sisters in South Africa responded with true patriotic affection, by organizing committees throughout the colony in the vicinity of the battle-fields.

So soon as this was achieved, through the patriotic affection of the Cape Town Guild of Loyal Women, we put ourselves into communication with the Imperial War Office, for whose additional assistance and consideration we are most grateful, and we are now in a position to state that the graves are being located and that some of them received their first fresh flowers on Christmas eve, when many women and children performed the annual tribute of patriotic love and gratitude. The same affectionate womanly effort will be performed on Easter eve, and photographs will be taken for sorrowing ones at home.

The permanent care of these graves has thus fallen to us as part of our work, and we have accepted it as a sacred duty and privilege. We now ask assistance from our Canadian people. We require a fund for the purpose, and we have much pleasure in announcing that the Canadian press has been most generous in coming to our aid.

Her Excellency the Countess of Minto has given the fund her special patronage, and has consented to act as honorary treasurer. The Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Hon. the Minister of Militia have also given our object their special patronage. Donations may be sent direct and at once to Her Excellency, Government House, Ottawa, and should be marked South African Graves.

Mrs. (Rev.) G. M. Campbell, Fredericton, treasurer of the provincial branch of the Daughters of the Empire, will act as treasurer

for New Brunswick of the fund for the Decoration of our South African Graves. All subscriptions to this fund received by Mrs. Campbell will be promptly forwarded to the Countess of Minto, and acknowledged through the provincial press. The children of Canada are especially invited to join in this beautiful idea. If every school boy and girl would send five cents we would have all the money required.
