Concerning Baking Powders.

REPORT OF THE INLAND REVENUE DEPARTMENT—LARGE QUANTITIES OF IMPURE POWDERS FOUND—SALE OF ALUM POWDERS FORBIDDEN.

The Bulletin of the Inland Revenue Department (68) contains analysis of 156 samples of baking powders bought of dealers and manufacturers in the Dominion.

In view of the large proportion of alum powder, Chief Analyst Macfarlane recommends that legal proceedings be taken against parties selling them, on the ground that they are unwholesome articles of food.

Professor Rattan, of McGill College, has analyzed the alum powder, and his report is of the positive opinion, is dangerous to health.

On reassembling, the Warden read a letter from R. A. Lawlor, asking that a fine of \$100 and costs imposed on Roger Flanagan, Chatham, in 1895, by Parish Court Commissioner Fraser, for a second violation of the Canada Temperance Act, be refunded.

The Warden suggested that it be referred to a committee, and, on motion of Coun. Ryan, this was done and the following committee appointed—Davidson, Tozer, Cameron, with instructions to investigate and report.

John Anderson presented the petition of John McDonald & Co., of Baxter, M. S. Holden and others praying that the Council grant \$100 towards the \$250 required to purchase a set of colors for the 73rd Regt.

Coun. Davidson moved to amend by asking also for a list of all the properties formerly belonging to the county that are now held by Chatham.

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Coun. Tozer said Inspector Menzies desired to be heard in reference to the Flanagan petition, and moved that he be heard, which was carried.

Mr. Menzies said he had listened attentively to Mr. Lawlor's letter, and some of its statements were not true. That conviction for a third offense was not quashed.

Coun. Connors said this was out of order. The petition had been referred to a committee and the committee should be left to act on it.

The Warden thought he was justified in putting the motion that Mr. Menzies be heard, though he entirely concurred in Coun. Connors' views that the committee should be left to consider it.

Coun. Tozer thought if anybody was out of order it was Coun. Connors in making such remarks.

Coun. Connors said he did not intend his remarks to apply to such case as to others. It was simply leaving time to allow persons to air their views here.

On motion of Coun. Saunders, adjourned till ten o'clock tomorrow morning.

NOTICE. Extracts from Act of Assembly 60, Vict. A. D. 1897. The property to the amount of Five Hundred dollars of a wife deserted by her husband and compelled to support herself and her children, shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of Two Hundred dollars; and in the case of a wife who has been deserted by her husband and who has no other means of support, she shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of One Hundred dollars for each minor child wholly supported by her.

NOTICE TO HOLDERS OF TIMBER LICENSES. The attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is called to Section 19 of this Timber Regulations which reads as follows:— "If No Spruce or Pine Trees shall be cut by any Licensee under any License, and even for piling, which will not make a log at least 16 feet in length and ten inches at the small end; and if any such shall be cut, the Licensee shall be liable to double stamp duty and the Licensee forfeited."
