A meeting of the Chatham Board of Trade was held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, last Thursday evening. President W S Loggie occupied the chair and Geo. Watt acted as secretary.

The president related the facts of an interview between Messrs. Tiffia and Wallace of the I. C. R., and himself in relation to freight rates on flour, the result of which appeared to be that they didn't seem to favor conceding an even rate with Frederictor. although there was a prospect of accomplish. ing that end should the Canada Eastern make the rate from the Junction to Chatham two cents. He also read a personal letter from Mr. Edmunds of the Canadian Grocer on the subject of the bankrupcy law, and it was understood that he himself should reply

The president also read a communication from the St. John Board of Trade desiring the cooperation of Chatham Board in opposing a bill that Hon. Mr. McKeown is promoting in the Legislature to enable civic tax defaulters in the city of St. John to vote at elections of mayor and aldermen.
