others discussed the by-law passed at the last meeting of the Town Council prohibiting the erection of wooden buildings in the business part of the town, Mr. Loggie submitting figures to show the almost prohibitive cost of fi e insurance and showing that if a high wooden building were put up on the property west of the Commercial Block the insurance rate on the latter, which is now 31%, would be four, with the same rate on the new building He showed that brick buildings, the insurance rates on which would be only one per cent., and which would bring higher rents, would be better investments than wooden ones. If Mr Elkin were to build of brick instead of wood he would be more in pocket in ten years. He referred to the fires of Windsor and Sydney and said if we had such a fire as either of these here everybody would be in favor of rebuilding with brick. Why not do it now and thus make ourselves as safe as possible against a general conflagration?

Extracts from Act of Assembly 60, Vict. A. D. 1897.

The property to the amount of Five Hundred dollars of a wife deserted by her husband and compelled to support herself; and where the whole orperty owned by a widow, as wel! the place where she resides as elsewhere, is under the value of Fifteen Hundred dollars, and such widow supports minor children of her own or of her deceased husband, her property in the parish where she resides shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of Two Hundred dollars; and also to the extent of One Hudred dollars for each minor child wholly suppor ed by her. If she has no property in the parish where she resides, then such exemption shall be allowed in the place where such property is situat ed ; but such exemption shall not apply or extend

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TIMBER LICENSES CROWN LAND OFFICE, 24 JULY, 1896. The attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is alled to Section 19 of the Timber Regulations which reads as follows ;-"19 No Spruce or Pire trees shall be cut by any Licensee under any License, not even

for piling, which will not make a log at least 18 feet in length and ten inches at the small end; and if any such shall be cut, the Lumber shall be liable to double stumpage and the License be torfeited" and all Licensees are hereby notified, that for the future, the provisions of this section will be rigidly
