Pope Leo XIII.

Pope Leo XIII, the 263rd successor of St. Peter, has entered upon his ninety-third year, having been born at Carpineto, in the diocese of Anagni, on March 2, 1810.

At that time the great Emperor Napoleon was at the height of his power, George III, was King of England, and James Madison was fourth President of the United States.

The Secret Foo of France.

Ever since the Franco-Prussian war in 1870, the French people have blamed England that she remained inactive and made no effort to put an end to the war by exerting her power and influence with the other nations of Europe, to intervene, and put an end to the strife.

The Premier is asked during the week as to what treatment he proposed to mete out to officials who took an active part in elections, and he replied that no change would be made in the procedure which had been adopted years ago.

Preferential Duties.

The question of preferential duties within the British Empire is a subject that has received a large amount of discussion not only in the colonies but in Britain, and it is likely to be one of the most important questions that will be brought before the colonial premiers when they meet in London next July.

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 6. The opening of the Legislature here 1-day reminded us of the best experiences connected with similar events in former days, when the Lieutenant Governors were residents of the provincial capital.

Incidentally, the matter of carrying out Government works by days labor rather than by contract, came up for consideration. Mr. Tarte, himself, was decidedly in favor of days labor, contending that, with proper supervision, it ensured the best value for the Government.

Mr. Charles Hibbert Tupper made his first appearance in Parliament for the session during the week. His coming carries with it the promise of a little more ginger in the tactics of the Opposition; for Sir Charles Hibbert is nothing if he is not a scrapper.

The Minister of Justice has introduced a bill in relation to telegraph and telephone companies, which is aimed to prevent any form of discrimination in respect of charges. If anyone wants a telephone, and deposits the prescribed toll therefor, the Company is obliged to install it with all reasonable dispatch, and neither as between localities nor persons can a difference of rate be allowed.

Mr. Fielding, replying to a question on Tuesday, submitted a statement with respect to the circulation of Dominion notes in the years 1896 and 1901. The issue of \$1 notes, which in 1896 amounted to 1,784,000 had increased last year to 2,760,000.

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The Government has received notice through Mr. Larke, Canadian Agent at Sydney, that the Premier of the Australasian Commonwealth proposes to visit Canada on his way to the Coronation ceremonies. He will do this informally, although he spends a short time in the Capital for the purpose of gathering information in advance of the proposed Conference of Colonial Premiers in London.

Yesterday, Mr. Monk brought up the subject of an all-ged announcement by the Imperial War Secretary in relation to the defense of the Empire. Mr. Broderick was quoted in a despatch as having said that four militia army corps would be new raised in Canada in connection with this plan, and he asked the government what foundation there was for the report.

His Honor Lieut. Governor Snowball.

On taking the throne, His Honor read the following opening speech:— SPEECH. Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Legislature:—

It affords me very great pleasure to meet you in Parliament assembled for the discharge of your important legislative duties for the first time since I have entered upon the trust reposed in me as the representative of His Most Gracious Majesty in this Province.

His Honor gave his first official dinner on Thursday evening at the Queen Hotel. The party was composed exclusively of gentlemen, and the function was greatly enjoyed by those who participated in it. Music was furnished by Haulon's string and reed instrument orchestra and Mrs. Edwards, under whose skilful direction most of the work of preparing the menu and table was done, was heartily congratulated on her success. Howe Dixon, Clerk of the Executive, Right Rev. Bishop Johnson, Hon. A. T. Dunn, Hon. C. H. LaBelle, Hon. G. F. Hill, Lieutenant Colonel Dunbar, R. C. R., Lieutenant Colonel Call, A. D. C., Mr. Ora P. King, Rev. J. T. Tassell, chap. of the House, Chancellor Harrison, Auditor General Beck, Major Cook, Woodstock Field Park, Mayor Crockett, Capt. LeDuc, Capt. of the Guards, Judge Wilkinson, D. Ferguson, Chatham, Capt. Lister, A. D. C., R. S. Barker, Mr. Ferguson was prevented by Thursday morning's snow-storm from joining the party who went over from Chatham for the opening ceremonies and Senator Parley was also absent on account of the death of a relative.

Amongst notes of the opening day of the legislature are the following:—"It was Miramichi's day at the Capital." "Col. Call and Col. McLean and their chief—the new Governor—made a handsome trio." "Best looking Governor we have had since confederation"—said an old timer in the gallery. "They know how to do things expeditiously on the Canada Eastern. Major Malby's guns were sent over from Newcastle by Thursday morning's train, fired the salute and were re-shipped and on their way home again at three p. m., so that they were back to Newcastle same night." "Alex. Gibson is the kind of a man to do a big-busted job, and Miramichi is so they don't claim him as their own entirely." "Premier Tweedie is putting on flesh. The happy way things have been going for him in political life is responsible for it." "If the Governor were elective, all the votes would be Snowball's. No other need apply."

The House got fairly down to work on Friday, when the debate on the Address, which was moved by Ora P. King, the newly returned member for Kings county and seconded by Dr. Ruddock, of St. John, was begun. The mover's speech was an excellent one. He read it from manuscript and did it well, but it was not as effective as it would have been had he delivered it in the usual way, which he appears well qualified to do. It referred to all the subjects suggested by the different paragraphs of the Speech and its reading was frequently greeted with applause. Dr. Ruddock, in seconding, made a brief speech. Mr. Hazen, who followed the speaker, complimented both Mr. King and the gentleman in their efforts. He thought Mr. King had spoken even better and more effectively, however, when he spoke at Moncton some years ago in condemnation of this government. He thought the omission of reference to the outgoing government was a singular one, for the late Governor Fraser had been mentioned in the Speech of his successor. After eulogizing ex-Governor McLean and heartily approved of Mr. Snowball's appointment, censured the government for alleged extravagance in connection with the visit of the Duke and Duchess of York, which, he said, was reported to have cost the province from \$25,000 to \$30,000, claimed that the Premier had insulted the committee representing the citizens of St. John by not recognizing them at the railway station in connection with the Duke and Duchess' reception; referred to the death of President McKinley and Earl Dufferin, said the government's agricultural policy was due to the initiative and support of the Dominion agricultural department; asked where the government's promised cold storage plants were; hoped to see the St. John Valley railway built; said the money received from the Eastern Extension award should not have been spent on current repairs; thought the fishermen of the province had received the equivalent of interest on the province's share of herring award; and concluded by complimenting the speaker on his having opened the Quebec conference policy and even moved a resolution against it in the House; produced a book written by Mr. W. A. Hickman for the information of intending emigrants from the Old Country, and said it was full of typographical and grammatical errors and also errors of fact; thought there should have been a reference in the Speech to the consolidation of the statutes, said, altogether, made a pleasant speech, almost entirely free from any suggestion of serious opposition to the government's policy on any important point.

It being a quarter to six, Premier Tweedie moved the adjournment of the debate, and it was afterwards made the order of the day for Monday. The Premier intimated to members that it would be well for those of them who had

local or private bills to offer to introduce them at as early a date in the session as possible. The annual report of the Hotel Dieu, Tracelle, presented by Hon. Mr. Tweedie, which showed that during the year 65 men, 44 women and four children were treated at the institution, a total of 113 patients. There were only two deaths. The Attorney General introduced a bill to fix and make certain the fees to be paid by municipalities to justices, constables and others in preliminary proceedings of criminal cases. Hon. Mr. Tweedie asked leave of absence for the session for Hon. Mr. McKewen, and for Messrs. Buras and R. Robertson until the 15th instant. At six o'clock the House adjourned until Monday at 3 p. m.

Fredericton, March 11.—Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill to amend chapter 53 of the consolidated statutes of parish courts, its object being to give commissioners jurisdiction for the whole county over all complaints or prosecutions arising within it for violation of any law in respect of which proceedings may be had in either the dominion or provincial summary conviction act. The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the Throne was continued by Hon. Mr. Tweedie, who was followed by Mr. Osman and Hon. Mr. Hill. The address then passed. Supply was made the order of the day for Thursday next.

Fredericton, March 11.—The standing rules committee held its first session this morning, Mr. Burchill in the chair. A number of petitions asking for the passage of certain bills introduced were considered. All passed except one from the St. John Fire Relief Association and one from the town of Newcastle. The contingencies committee also met this morning, Hon. Mr. Farris in the chair, and Messrs. Appleby, O'Brien (of Charlotte), O'Brien (of Northumberland), Scott, Laforest, Gasier, Osman, Shaw, Whitehead and Copp being present.
