If anyone wants a telephone. and deposits the prescribed toll therefor. all reasonable dispatch, and neither as between localities nor persons can a difference of rate be allowed. At the same time, the Government reserves to itself the right to take over all telegraph and telephone lines at a valuation, and to carry them on in the interest of the public. This measure is not of a radical character, but is simply designed to make clear what has hitherto been open to doubt. It does not embody any provision looking to the establishment of a maxi mum charge by either telegraph or telephone companies.

> Mr. Fielding, replying to a question on Tuesday, submitted a statement with respect to the circulation of Dominion notes in the years 1896 and 1901. The issue of \$1 notes, which in 1896 amounted to 1,784,000 had increased last year to 2,760 000. The number of \$2 notes had increased during the same period from 1.008,000 to 1.616,000. The \$4 denomination had risen from 176,000 to 816,000. This expansion has been due to the general development of business throughout the country, and as the rate of increase in being maintained it is fair to assume that the tide of prosperity is still on the



HIS HONOR LIEUT. GOVERNOR On taking the throne, His Honor read the following opening speech :-

Mr Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Legisla. tive Assemb'y: It affords me very great pleasure to meet you in Parliament assembled for the discharge of your important legislative duties for the first time since I have entered upon the trust reposed in me as the representative of His Most Gracious Majesty in this Pro-

We have recently been honored by the visit of their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, now the Prince and Princess of Wales, and the Government of the Province took the necessary measures to receive the Royal party in a suitable manner. The enthusiastic greeting accorded to the distinguished visitors was especially pleasing to them, and testified in a marked degree to the loyalty of the people of our Province. During the past summer His Excellency

the Governor General and the Countess of Minto visited various sections of the Province and were everywhere most enthusiastically received. Their gracious manner and the deep interest shown by their Excellencies in the industries, progress and welfare of our people, have produced a favorable and lasting impression. The death, at the hands of an assassin. of the President of the neighboring Republic, with which this Province has such intimate

with all civilized nations, at the lamentable and tragic event.

I am happy to be able to congratulate you upon the prosperous condition of business. and the success which is attending the efforts of our people in the various pursuits in which they are engaged. The continued and rapid development of the Dairying industries of the Province, as shown by the increase in the production and exports of cheese and butter by the large number of cheese factories and creameries which have been established under the liberal encouragement afforded by the Government, is most gratifying. Being satisfied that there is reason to hope for in tefinite expansion in this direction, my Government will, with your approval, continue the same vigorous

policy as hitherto. The building of improved Roller Flour Mil's has given considerable impetus to the growth of wheat and has resulted in saving to our people large sums of money which would otherwise be sent out of the Province for flour. I am sure that you will be grat fied to know that the financial assistance which you authorized for the erection of these mills has already been productive of such good results, and that you will approve of this policy being continued so that all parts of the country may receive the benefit of Government assistance in this

Consequent upon the legislation passed at the last session to provide for the development of the coal areas of Queens and Sunbury, the railway to the coal fields is now under construction, and it will not be long before the live from Chipman to Fredericton will be completed. My Government anticipates a marked stimulus to the industrial life of the Province as well as a very considerable addition to the Provincial revenues as a result of this undertaking.

THE WINTER PORT. The rapid development of Canadian winter business through the Port of St. John is most gratifying. The aid granted some years ago by the Province towards the building of wharves and an elevator at that Port, and the extremely liberal expenditure on the part of the city, have produced results which cannot but prove of permanent benefit, not alone to the City of St. John but to the whole province, and to the Dominion as well, which is interested in having Canadian business carried on through Canadian ports.


