Mr. E. T. D. Chambers, of Quebec, writing of this season's salmon fishing in Forest and S ream, says :-



placed an order for a wagon according to plans prepared by himself. The great wagon is now completed. Mr. Ketchum will be accompanied by Mrs. Ketcham and their daughter. The wagon is a wonder and a complete house on wheels. It is divided into several compartments. There are sleeping rooms, dining room, reading room and office and bath room. At night when the time comes to pitch camp, a tent-like structure is arranged. This is accomplished by stretching canvas from the top of the wagon on either side to the ground. By this arrangement a complete kitchen, servants' quarters, etc., are arranged. Beds. stoves and all other necessaries for comfortable house-keeping are carried along in the wagon. There is a boat large enough to hold a dozen people attached to the side of the vehicle. Six powerful mules, which Mr Ketcham purchased some time ago, will furnish motive power. Mr. Ketchum's plan is to ship the entire caravan by rail to some point in Wyoming, and from there proceed, through the Yellowstone Park on an overland trip, which will cover anywhere rom 750 to 1000 miles.

A Shocking Pulp Mill Calamity.

A disaster at the Delaware pulp mills of the Jessup & Moore Paper Company, which took place August 20th, is the most appalling that has befallen the pulp trade in a long series of years. As the record now stands, and it is complete, every man in the digester room at the time of the accident, seventeen in all, was killed, and the pulp mill itself was wrecked. The cause of the explosion is not known and never will be, for there are no living witnesses to tell what happened just before the digester tore itself apart, Considering only the explosion as such, there are some facts that make it remarkable. The digesters were of the direct fire type, ten in a row. They were examined on the Sunday previous to the disaster. They were all running under 10 pounds less pressure than they had been formerly, in order to overcome some faults produced in the pulp by the higher pressure. The digester that exploded was marked to blown off just three minutes after the time when the explosion occurred, and strange to say the fire had been withdrawn from beneath the digester two hours and a quarter before the accident. The rupture was near the level of the blow off pipe, and the terrific force that was in the digester may b realized when it is stated that the uppe part of it being the greater part of entirety, was blown through the roof, over smokestack 125 feet high, and when landed it was driven into the earth to a depth of over 6 feet.
