Adulteration in Canada. Some objections may be made to legislation in Canada to require all imitation of woollen goods to be marked so as to show the constituent fibres and other materials and the relative proportions of each. As an epitome of the Grosvenor Bill, introduced into the United States House of Representatives, the following extract may be quoted :- "All manufactures of goods or fabrics of any kind whatsoever made in imitation of woollen goods or fabrics, or goods which when so made are calculated or intended to be sold as woollens or woollen goods, not made wholly of new or unused sheep, wool, shall so mark, label or tag such goods, as that they may be readily distinguished from genuine wools, or wool lens, as defined in the first section of this Act. That such mark label or tag shall be so attached, as that it cannot be detached except by design, and such label shall

Why should not legislation along the If you decline to take care of the road

Take for instance the various laws already on the statute book in reference to dairy products. Let me quote :- (a) "No oleomargarine, butterine, or other substitute for butter shall be manufactured in Canada or sold therein, and every person who contravenes the provisions of this Act in any manner whatsoever, shall incur a penalty not exceeding four hundred dollars, and not less than two hundred dollars, and in default of payment shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months and not than three months. (b) No person sell, supply or send to any cheese butter or condensed milk factory. the owner or manager thereof, or to the maker of butter, cheese or condensed milk, to be manufactured, milk diluted with water, or in any way adulterated, or milk from which any cream has been taken, or milk commonly known as skim

milk. (c) No person shall manufacture, or shall knowingly buy, sell, offer or expose for sale, or have in his possession for sale any cheese manufactured from or by the use of skim milk, to which there has been added any fat which is foreign to milk. (d) No person shal sell, offer, expose or have in his possession for sale any cheese manufactured from or by the use of milk commonly known as skimmed milk, or milk from which crean has been removed, or milk to which skim milk has been added, unless the words "skim milk cheese," are branded, marked or stamped in a legible manner upon the side of every cheese or package which contains the same in letters not less than three-quarters of an inch high and theeequarters of an inch wide. (e) No person shall sell, offer, expose or have in his possession for sale any butter or cheese made in Canada and destined for export therefrom, unless the word, "Canadian," "Canadien," or "Canada" is printed, stamped or marked in a legible and indelible manner, in letters not less than three eighths of an much high. quarter of an inch wide upon (1) The box complaints in this way, and he could, of cheese, upon the cheese itself, pefore it is taken from the factory where it was made. GENTLEMEN :- Some time ago you applied me for the use of the road roller which was purchased by the government for use in Northumberland, as you required the same for repairing the roads of the town. I re.dly gave my consent that you could have the roller, and instructed those in charge of it n Newcastle to hand it over to you. You have used it for some time and, after work was knished, you have left it lying just carried. where operations ended, exposed to the weather and without taking any care of it.

You have used the road machine in the same way, and I, without wishing to use too strong language, think I am justified in saying that your action is disgraceful. The machine is very valuable and, certainly, where you get the use of it without any charge whatever, it is not too much to exnect that reasonable care shall be taken of it while in your charge. The road machine has been abandoned by you as soon as operations ceased, and left to take care of itself. This, certainly, is not creditable to a town like Chatham.
