For England. His Lordship Bishop Kingston left for England on Saturday, 3rd, as a passenger on the P. & N. steamer, Newcastle, this afternoon. During his absence the clergy are to apply in all legal matters to the Chancellor of the Diocese, Mr. T. W. Carlton Allen, Fredericton, and in other matters of minor detail to the secretary of the Board of Missions, Rev. J. D. W. Cowie, Sussex. His Lordship was presented with a purse of \$1,000—the gift of the Diocese—before leaving. The Bishop anticipated spending most of the time during his stay abroad in London with his brother, one of the leading surgeons of that city. He has quite recovered from the immediate effects of his recent severe illness, but is yet weak and unable to attend to the onerous duties of his high position. He will spend the time of his trip abroad quietly and hopes to fully recuperate. He anticipates being back in time for the Synod meeting.

There were present, Revs. Canon Forsyth, R. D. W. J. Wilkinson, C. O'Dell Baynes, Geo. L. Freeman and T. H. Cuthbert. After some discussion with regard to the proposed Century Fund in connection with the Diocese, the following resolutions were carried:—"Resolved that this Chapter is in accord with the report of the sub-committee on the 19th Century Thanksgiving Fund as found on page 171 of the Report of 1900. That the Rev. Canon Forsyth be the representative from the Deacons to the Committee of Management. That a committee be formed in each parish in the Deacons. That a special agent be appointed for the Deacons. That Rev. Geo. L. Freeman be the said agent."

The Time to Cut Hay. The aim of our farmers in growing forage crops is to produce from a given area as large a quantity as possible of the digestible nutriment in a palatable form. The time at which a forage crop is harvested may affect the crop in three ways, viz.—in the quantity of material harvested, in the composition of the crop, and in the palatability of the fodder. As a general rule it has been found that the greatest amount of dry matter is secured where forage crops are allowed to fully mature and ripen. The only exception is in the case of clovers and other legumes, where the leaves rot off and are lost, either before or during the process of curing.

Something New in Silos. Much has been written in regard to silos and silo building, and numerous plans have been published, but in actual experience none of them has proved entirely satisfactory. Some are too expensive for ordinary farmers, others are cheap, but last only a few years. The round silo silo is one of the cheapest sorts, and if it were not liable to collapse on account of shrinkage of the staves, and the expansion of the iron hoops, it would be very satisfactory. There is now a prospect of these disadvantages being overcome. A number of farmers in the United States have adopted the plan of using wooden hoops, which do not shrink or lengthen with the weather. The inside sheathing is of one inch Georgia pine, which is the best kind of lumber for
