Death of Very Ray. Dean Hoffman.

One of the best known members of the Restigouche Salmon Club - Very Rev. Eugene Hoffman, Dean of the Anglican theological schools of the United Statesdied near Plattsburg, N.Y., while making the journey from Metapedia to his home in the city of New York on Tuesday of last week. Dean Hoffman, as he was generally called, Among the contributions at the blessing of was always one of the first members to arrive each season at the Restigouche Salmon D. The Dean arrived at the club house this season on 6th June, on a private car, accompanied by Mrs. Hoffman, Miss Dodds, his physician, Dr. C. E. Carter, and a male attendant. He was quite ill when he arrived, his chief trouble seeming to be of the heart. He was able, however, a few days after taking up his quarters at the club house, to go out fishing on the main pool two or three times, taking a wheel chair to the shore and being accompanied, in his big Gaspe canoe, by Dr. Carter, or someone else besides his canoemen. He killed a 22 pound salmon on 12th inst. - his last fish of many

he had taken from the same pool, On the following Sunday-the 15th-his ndisposition increased and he became most anxious to get to New York. He, however, "KILL THE COON," rallied again, but was still desirous of getting away at once, and to secure a special train or the purpose. A private combination Pullman could not, however, be obtained and General Manager Pottinger very kindly endered his own private car, which was to have been run all the way through as a special, with right of way to New York via the Delaware and Hudson R. R. This special left Metapedia a few minutes past nine o'clock on Monday evening, 16th, and reached Montreal before 8 a.m. Tuesday. Something went wrong on the D. & H road end of the journey, and there were no engine and crew ready to proceed on the first stage from Montreal. During his stay each season at the club's headquarters, it was his custom to hold service once each Sunday in the little Sunday, school building on the club house grounds. Owing to his illness this season, and the fact that the building has been occupied by one of the families burned out by the recent big fire which practically

destroyed Metapedia Village, he did not hold the usual services. He was a liberal giver and, amongst his donations was the fine bell of the Dawsonville church. His largest contributions to Canada religious purposes were, no doubt, those to the Seminary in New York, in which he took so great an interest. They are said to have been over a million dollars.
