Very Early Arrivals.

The earliest arrivals this season came into port on Monday. First came the sea-going tug Douglas H. Thomas, bringing the barges Lizze and Alice, coal-laden, in tow from Louisburg, N. S., consigned to the Dominion Coal Company. Next was the Norwegian steamer, Falco, of 1376 tons, Capt. Hansen, from Cardiff, making the run from that port in eleven and a half days. An hour or tw later came the British steamer, Ramleh, 1666 tons, Captain Dueting, which made the run from New York to this port in four and a half days.

It has been said that there are the earliest arrivals ever made at this port, but there was an earlier one by a sailing ship in 1846. so that it is fifty-six years since as early arrivals were recorded as those of this

The steamship Ceylon, went over the Miramichi bar on 15th December last, so that these arrivals, on 21st April, show that we have been without a trans Atlantic steamer in port for only three of the twelve calendar months of the year. KLERKSDORP, April 18 .- Gen. Ian Hamilon in a further drive has captured 64 Boers. LONDON, April 18. - The government leader, A. J. Balfour, in the House of Commone to-day made the following important

statement : "After two conferences between Lord Kitchener and Lord Milner and the Boer delegates, at Pretoria, Lerd Kitchener, while refusing to grant an armistice on military grounds, has agreed to give facilities for the election and meeting of representaives of the various Boer commands to consider the position. The Boer leaders have, therefore, left Pretoria to earry out that

Mr. Balfour added that it was not exected that communication between the British authorities and the Boer leaders could be resumed in less than three weeks

LONDON, April 17. - Serious differences, it is said, have arisen between the Transvaal and Free State delegates who are discussing peace terms at Pretoria.

General Botha and Acting President Schalk Burger, it is reported, have given the Free State representatives until April 21 to come to a decision, threatening that, hereafter, the Transvaal delegation will continue the peace negotiations independently of the

Free State delegates. It is further asserted that Botha and Kent. Schalk-Burger practically had agreed upon erms for surrender prior to their visit to Klerksdorp, but that, out of loyalty to their allies, they insisted on a conference, though with slight hopes that their views would be shared by General De Wet and the other Free State leaders.

The Miramichi Steam Navigation Com pany's new passenger and freight steame under construction by Messre, Ruddock is their Miramichi Foundry & Machine Works daughter. building yard, West End, Chatham, is to be launched at six o'clock this morning. She is to be christened by Mlss Burchill, daughter of Hon. J. P. Burchill, president of the Company.

The "Alexandra's" dimensions are length o keel, 90 feet; over all 105 feet; breadth beam, 24 feet ; depth of hold, 9 feet. The keel is of beach, the frames of birch, juniper and spruce ; the planking of birch, beed and apruce, 21 inches thick.

The engines are of the compound four ar oft type, with cylinders 16 and 30 inches in diameter respectively and stroke of 18 inches. The shaft is of steel, 6 inches i diameter. The boiler is of steel, 81 feet In liameter and 12 feet long. It will carry steam at 126 lbs. pressure. The propeller is four-blader, 84 inches in diameter.

The "Alexandra" will carry four hundred passengers, and she has also good capacity for freight. Being classed for passengers. she was required to be better fastened than if she were designed as a freighter only. Al the through fastenings below the water are of Muntz metal ; all other fastenings in | time. whatever part are of galvanized iron. She will have a saloon cabin, and an upper deck house sixty feet long. This will give a clear space aft of about twenty feet which will be full sheltered overhead by an awning deck. There will be a free passage around the saloon cabin on either side and the after cabin on the main deck has also a free sage around it. There is a toilette room each for ladies, gentlemen and the crew. The stairway leading to the upper deck will be amidships and will lead up from near the entrance to the main deck after cabia.

Altogether, the new steamer gives promis of seaworthiness, good speed and comfort for those on board. She was designed by late J. M. Ruddock, who superintended construction, built the engines, etc. M Patrick Desmond was master shipwright and he is to be congratulated on his good

News and Notes.

The preachers' aid fund of the New England Methodist Conference is short about \$19,000 through bad western investments. The investments were made some years ago when large interests rates were a taking bait for gudgeons.

A bill has been drafted in Russia by special commission which makes it illegal in future for government orders of any kind to be placed abroad, unless it can be conclusively shown that the articles required are not produced in the Russian empire at all. The P. E. Island Legislature was pro-

The archbishop of Halifax has forwarded to Hon, Mr. Chamberlain, the British Colonial Secretary, through Hon. Mr. Scott, the Canadian Secretary of State, resolutions adopted by the Catholics of twenty-four parishes in the diocese of Halifax, favoring repeal of that portion of the British accession oath objectionable to Catholics. The resolutions of the Halifax city Catholics were forwarded to Rome weeks ago.

The Bangor and Aroostook Railway hauled 667,306 bushels of potatoes out Aroostook county in March; the total hauling of the 1901 crop by that road from Aroustook county up to the end of March amounted to 3,089,409 bushels. One Aroostook's largest potato dealers estimated that ten per cent. of the 1901 crop yet remains to be marketed. The potato plant this spring will be considerably in advance of any preceding year, if one may judge from the quantity of fertilizers purchased.

The death took place last Friday evening, at his residence near Fredericton, of Mr. Wm. Kinghorn, a well-known Independent Forester, provincial organizer for that order, and past high chief ranger and past representative to the supreme high court. For some years he successfully carried on a large tannery business established by his father at Nashwaaksis, and also manufactured moscasins on an extensive scale. About four years ago he gave up business to engage in organizing work for the Independent Order of Foresters. About a year ago he was taken ill with brain trouble. Mr. Kinghorn was ferty-seven years of age, and leaves a widow, three sens and one young
