Bishop Rozers' Valedictory

His Lordship, Bishop Rogers has issued valedictory circular letter to the clergy. religious sisters and faithful laity of the Diocese of Chatham on the occasion of his retirement as Bishop and the succession to the office of Bishop of Chatham of Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Barry, D. D. The letter conveys also on Monday last. the benediction of both Bishops, sets forth briefly the fact of Bishop Roge s' resignation having been accepted by the Holy Father, the Pope and the entry into the office of Bishop Barry by right of succession.

Bishop Rogers proceeds to address the people of the diocese which he has beneficeatly administered for forty two years, on the relationship between waster and people. He concludes by bearing testimony to the mutual love and esteem which have always existed between the clergy and their flicks, the true catholic piety of the Last evening an interesting event took latter, -simple, apright, intelligent, humble and charitable-wishing to do towards others as they would have others do towards them felicitations to all, not only the members of

His Lordship expresses gratitude and his own flock, but to ail his fellow-cit-zens o whatever creed or nationality, from whom he received kindness and good will, and he prays God to bless them and ever have them in His holy keeping. Concluding this part of his letter the Bishop says:-

"I wish especially to express humble thanks to our Holy Father Pope Leo XIII. and to all the venerable person co-operating with him in the government of the church. I wish also to express congratulations for the devoted Pastor, now happily succeeding me in the government of the flock from which I am perm tted to withdraw. May this holy union and love always endure !
