The settlement was to take place in the offices of Cantor Adams & McIntyre last Friday at 11 o'clock. Shortly after that hour Turner, with his lawyer, and Messrs. Hamilton and Mallard, with Messrs. Adams and Goodman, of the Adams law firm, went to Mr. Adams' private office. Mr. Malard asked Turner for the \$2,700 certified cheque which it was expected he would pay in settlement of the dispute with his late associates. He replied : "Yes I will let you have it" and, thrusting the sad news of his death a few days his hand in his breast pocket, he drew a selfcocking revolver and pointing it at Mallard uttered an oath and fired two shots at him, both of which went through his heart. Meanwhile all the others, save Hamilton and Adams scrambled out and fled. Turner next fired at Hamilton and struck him in The fu :eral will take place this after- the back. Then Adams made his escape and, immediately, another shot was heard, followed by the fall of a body. Then all was still. It was subsequently ascertained that the murderer used the last shot to end his own life. It turned out that Turner had a cheque for \$2,700 on his person purporting to be a certified one, but while his own signature to it was genuine, the name of the party signed as certifying it had no connection with the bank on which it was

It may be that Turner would not have shot the other gentlemen who were in the room if they had remained, but as he had a second loaded revolver on his person, it would seem that his intention was to have made a general slaughter. Mr. Adams, who is a former Miramichi man and an eminent New York lawyer, seems to have had a narrow escape, over which his many friends here and elsewhere join in congratu-



### Homicide at Bathurst.

On Saturday night, 11th instant, Burns Gloucester County jail Mason, who was the first mate of the three masted schooner Georgia, of Boston, loading lumber at Bathurst, was brutally assaulted by being struck on the back of the head with a bottle, in Kenny's saloon, Bathurst Village, by one of the crew named Frank Lyman. Mason was taken to the marine hospital. A Bathurst despatch of Monday says :

The post-mortem examination on the body of Burus Mason was held by Drs. Meahan, Daucan and McNichol on Saturday and permission given by the coroner for the removal of the body to the home deceased's parents at Country Harbor, Guysboro county, N. S. The deceased was only twenty-three years of age. The inque-t was opened on Saturday afterdoon, and after hearing the evidence of Capt. Longmire, of the schooner Georgia, and one of the sailors, proceedings were adjourned until this moraing at 10 o'clock. Constables are now on the track of Lyman and chances are that his capture will be effected in a day or two. In the evidence of the captain it came out that there was an old grudge between Lyman and the deceased, the former having used a sheath knife on Mason while on the voyage from New York to Bathurst. In order to defend himself from the attack of Lyman on that occasion, Mason had to make use of a capstan bar, and in the struggle received an ugly knife wound over the right eye. When the vessel arrived in port on the ninth instant Lyman went ashore refused to come on board, the reporting him in his log book as a deserter. He met Mason, as already stated, in a saloon on Saturday night, eleventh, and inflicted the treacherous blow which has since caused his death. It is supposed now that the blow was given with a slung shot. The body of the deceased was sent to Antigonish by the Maritime express this morning. John J. Harrington, Esq., Clerk of the

Peace for Gloucester county, telegraphed to Deputy Chief of Police Jenkins, St. John, on Saturday, describing two Norwegian sailors who were in Lahey's saloon, with others, at the time Lyman struck the fatal blow, and requesting their detention as witnesses and possibly accomplices in the murder of Burns Mason.

Detective Killen was put on the case and the two men, Adolph Pedersen, 21, and Oie Hammel, 19, were arrested on Saturday the Gloucester county authorities and on Tuesday went in charge of constable umberland County Court.

Great Shediac Fire

A big fire at Shediac on Wednesday of last week consumed property value d at \$150,000. The fire-swept area includes the principal business portion of the town, taking in all the business houses and buildings on the north side of Main street from Lawton's drug store on the east to R. C. Tait's building, occupied by Lawyer McFadgen and others on the west. All that remains between these two points to indicate that this territory was occupied by buildings, previous to the confligration, are the blackened ruins and the brick walls of the post office building and the Poirier block. A large number of people from the surrounding country visited the scene of desolation on Wednesday and Thursday, but few were able to realize the full extent of the loss sustained by those who carried on business within the fire-swept district. Even the sufferers themselves are unable to accurately estimate the extent of the devastation. But this would not include the loss of business and losses in other ways, that none but those would be able to understand.
