THE NEW SENATOR.—Hon. Fred P. Thompson, of Fredericton, is to succeed Hon. Mr. Snowball in the Senate.

An Outside View of Miramichi's Reception of Governor Snowball.

Referring to the reception tendered to His Honor, Lt. Governor Snowball on Saturday at Newcastle and Chatham, the Fredericton Gleaser says:—

"Altogether the Governor's return seems to have called out a remarkable popular demonstration. As a rule, one takes the Governor pretty much for granted, and his reception is apt to be a little perfunctory.

There was one feature in the address presented at Newcastle to which attention may be directed. It was said that while the Governor would, by the nature of his office, require to spend the greater part of his time in the Capital they were "glad to know that conformity with public ideas in that regard will not, necessarily, involve the removal of yourself and family from our midst to any permanent extent."

This is another evidence of the general appreciation of the fact to which we called attention a few days since, that if you do without a Government House you have largely to do without a Governor. The Province has realized this during the last few years and realized that it is likely to be a permanent condition so long as the parsimonious policy is continued.

The Gleaser takes too much for granted. While the people of Chatham are, doubtless, a unit in the desire to retain Mr. Snowball as a resident of the town, for which he has done so much, we think they were never in favor of the closing of Government House at the Capital.

New Brunswick at the King's Coronation.

The Premier of New Brunswick has been invited by Colonial Secretary Chamberlain to come to London and participate in the coronation celebration that is to take place there in June next. The invitation was considered by the government at its meeting last week and it was decided to accept it.

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The Legislature of the Province will, of course, not fail in its duty of enabling Premier Tweedie to make the journey to London in a manner befitting the position he holds, and worthy of the people of New Brunswick whom he will represent at the royal function and the attendant celebrations and festivities.

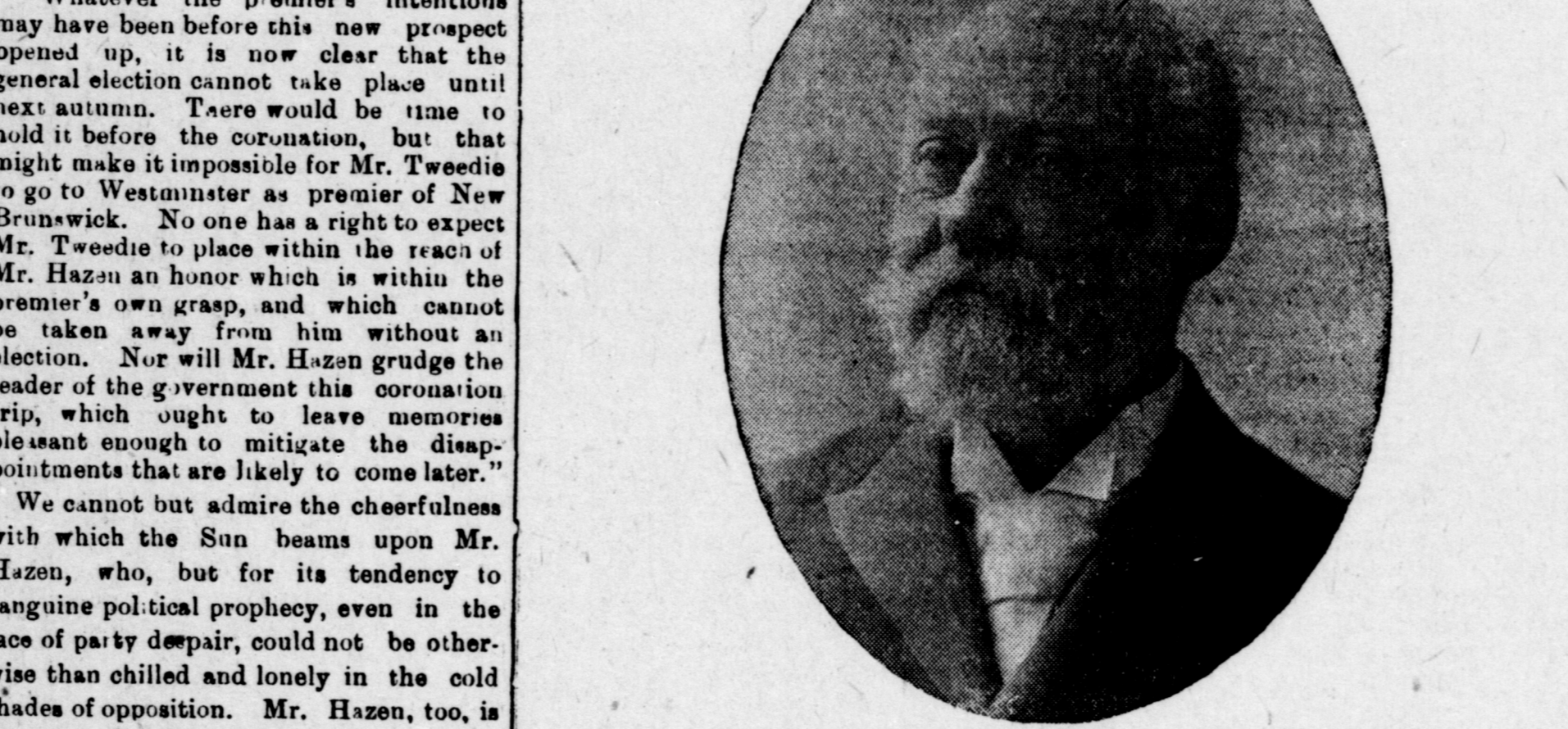

When it became known on Friday that Hon. J. B. Snowball, the newly appointed Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, was expected to arrive home from Ottawa by the Maritime express on Saturday morning, citizens of Chatham, Newcastle and other centres expressed the idea that he ought to receive a hearty Miramichi welcome.

The committee appointed consisted of Major Malby, of the 12th Battery, Major Morrison of Newcastle, R. A. Lawlor, John O'Brien, M. P. P., Lt.-Col. Call, Major Mackenzie and Judge Wilkinson, with power to add to their number.

After the adjournment of the meeting Major Malby took the chair, to which the said he was appointed, and Messrs. J. D. Stewart, James Robinson, M. P., C. E. Fish, M. P. P., Hon. John Barrell, M. P., Hon. Premier Tweedie, Hon. Allan Ritchie and Mr. Maher were added to the committee.

The chairman and secretary were instructed to inform Governor Snowball on the train, by telegraph, of the preparations for his reception and to request him to get at Newcastle station. It was also ordered that Judge Wilkinson and Mr. D. G. Smith prepare a suitable address in behalf of the people of Northumberland, to be read and presented by Colonel Call, High Sheriff of the County. Major Mackenzie was entrusted with the duty of providing a guard of honor and with Mr. Maher to notify the bands, whose members, it was understood, had already determined to honor the new government on their own account.
