



Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, was expected to arrive home from Ottawa by the Maritime express on Saturday morning, citizens of Chatham, Newcastle and other centres expressed the idea that he ought to receive a hearty Miramichi welcome. Members of Chatham Town Council were interviewed on the subject and, as a result a notice was issued by Town Clerk Gaynor for a citizens' meeting at four o'clock. The meeting was well attended and presided over by ex-Mayor Loggie,

Town Clerk Gaynor being chosen secretary. Different suggestions were made as to the form which the proposed demonstration should take, but that 'by R. A. Lawlor, K.C., prevailed. He said Col. Call and Hop. Allan Ritchie of Newcastle had been in town that forenoon and spoken of the matter, and they had agreed that the best plan would be to have Governor Snowball leave the train at Newcastle and there receive a county address, and then proceed to Chatham, accompanied by the up-river people who would join in a celebration here.

Maichy, of the Newcastle Field Battery, said he thought there would be no difficulty in having salute fired and the band would also tues out, etc.

Judge Wilkinson, John O'Brien, M. P. P., Robt. Murray, K. C., ald. Nicol, D. G. Smith, F. E. Neale and C. A. C. Bruce all endorsed Mr. Lawlor's suggestion and, on motion of ald. Nicol it was voted to appoint a committee to carry it out.

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Public Health. The Provincial Board of Health met last Thursday afternoon in St. John. There were present Dr. Bayard, Dr. E. B. Fisher, Premier Tweedie, James

Holly and John McMillan. The meeting was called to consider ertain amendments in the board of health act, whereby the duties of the local and provincial boards will be more closely defined. Instances have, in the past, arisen wherein the powers of the local and provincial boards were found to conflict. It has also been demonstrated that in some cases the local boards had powers in

excess of the provincial board. It has for some time been felt that the provincial board should to some extent be the governing body, and it was to consider such amendments as will bring about this condition that last Thursday's meeting

The board decided that such amend ments were desirable, and they will be recommended to the government. Another matter discussed was the vaccination of all children in the province, and it was decided to make this com-

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
