With regard to the fishery claim, he was not as much worried as the leader of the Province was entired to it for it had been decided by the highest court of the Empire that the fisheries, for the use of which for 12 years Canada had received the money under the Halifax award were the property of the respective provinces. The sum received by Canada was \$4,500,000 and this was paid in November, 1878. The simple interest for twenty-three and one-halt years would bring the total sum principal and interest up to \$9.780 500 with the interest compounded every six months, of the award was in the vicinity of \$100 000 The amount paid to New Bouswick fishermen for bounties was \$291,000 up to the year 1900. The value of the New Brunswick fisheries for the 12 years the reaty was in operation was \$33,849,200. The total value of the fisheries of the three Maritime Provinces and Quebec for the same period being \$153,486 000. 
