Sussex Military Camp

An Ottawa despatch says that orders have been issued for the annual military camp to be held in Sussex, (N. B.), Sept. 9 to 20. The training for the minitia includes only the officers and non-commissioned officers In the permanent force, the entire strength is called out-the 5th division, comprising divisional troops ; four squadrons 8 h Hussars and No. 4 Company, R. C. R, full strength. The 11th Infantry Brigade, consisting of 67th, 71st, 73 d, 74th and 82nd Regiments. The intantry regiments will be represented by one lieutenant colonel, one major, one adjutant, one quarter master, two staff sergeants per regiment three company sergeauts per company, three corporals per company, two buglars per regiment and 22 privates for fatigue duties

For the West.

It is said that the number of men who have gone from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Elward Island to work harvesting in northwestern Canada wi hin the past week, is about 2,000. Nearly one hundred of them are from the North Shore of New Brunswick-many from Chatham and points along the Canada Eastern Railway. Quite a number of these are on their second or taird annual trip to Manicoba and other western sections. The trip out costs them \$10 each to where their work is ; they receive about \$35 a month "and found" : after working a mouth or more they are entitled to a r-turn tick-t to the point they started from, for \$18. The young men enjoy the trip, see the Western country, where a few of them remain, but most them return with enlarged ideas and are the better for the outing.


