There was quite a rush slong parts Water street to the ends of the wharves of flursday, caused by the upsetting of a sail boat in the middle of the river, just below the line of the steam ferry route. There vas very little wind blowing at the time, but the upset had taken place, and the two young men who had been occupants of the mat were seen in the water with their craft nearly bottom up and almost out of sight beneath the surface. Two row boats made for them, one of which, of course, got there first and made the floating vach smen safe. Then a two-sarled boat took them on board and made for the Chatham shore, towing the sapsized and submerged boat by the painter. or mooring line. It turned out to be the trim little craft owned by policeman Adam Dickeson, which was being sailed by Messrs. George Russell and G-orge Walsh of the West E.d. 


