



London, April 14.-News of severe fighting in the Transval at the end of last week. has been sent by Lord Kitchener, who reports that about two hundred Boers were killed, wounded or captured. There were about 100 British casualties. The British also captured three guns and considerable quantities of supplies, Commandant Potgieter was among the Boers killed. Lord K tchener in a despatch dated

Pretoria, April 13, recounts how Col. Colenbrander, after locating Commandant Botha's laager at Pz-lkop, moved his force up by different roads from Pietersburg. Transvaal colony, blocking the principal lines of retreat. The fighting commenced April when the Inniskilling Fusiliers attacked Molipspoort, securing the Boer position and by dusk had secured a hill in spite of siderable opposition, resulting in Co
