Death of Mr. Dean Sage.

Dean Sage of Albany, the founder of the Harmony Club, whose headquarters are at the mouth of the Upsalquitch on the Restigouche would, no doubt, if he were alive, enjoy having clerical honors conferred on him, as they were last week by the Times and Transcript, of Moncton, both of which represented his death as the "carrying off" of a clergyman. Mr. Sage was a regular business man-a capitalist-and, in his spare time, wrote books and went fishing. His best literary work was on subjects connected with fish and game, for he was an ardent angler and sportsman and was at his best when by the river or in the forest, in company with friends of tastes similar to his own. His death took place on Tuesday afternoon last. That morning he appeared to be in his usual good health. He went out on the river with his cancemen and killed three salmon in the forenoon. After lunch he went out again and spent three hours on the river, when he was seized with a severe pain in the region of the heart. which, in spite of all that could be done for him with the means at hand, grew rapidly worse and ended in death in a very short time. The remains were taken by way of the river to Metapedia and thence by rail to New York, leaving on Tuesday night by a special train.



New St. John's Church, Chatham.

The new church of St. John's congregaion, Chatham, which has been under construction since about August, 1900, when excavation for the foundation was begun, is to be opened for public worship on Sunday next. The structure is of wood and of unique but handsome design, in which the gothic order predominates. The illustration of its eastern front facade on Cunard street. which we give herewith, will convey a bet ter idea of its general exterior features than any description we might make. The Wellington street facade, although not so long as the eastern, is equally handsome, while a view which takes in this front and the western side with its octagnal corner tower and apse, is even more imposing and p'easing to the eye. Indeed, the church has a massive and handsome appearance from all points view and is amongst the best of its class the province. Its general dimensions are

structure of the church rests. As the illustration shows, the angles an corners are buttressed and the walls relieved by an ornamental belt-course, the towers ending in pinnacles and finials.

The main entrance is through a gothic porticoed deorway in the base of the main tower, corner of Cunard and Wellington streets. A handsome flight of steps leads up to the massive oaken double doors which open into a spacious vestibule. There is also an entrauce in the smaller tower on the west corner fronting Wellington street and one through a doorway in the southern tower on Cunard street leading into the Sunday school section, and still another for the pastor, sunday school superintendent and members of the choir in the western side of the church opposite to the general sunday school entrance. These three minor door

ways are all hooded. The walls and buttresses are covered with sawn shingles which are laid on in three, two window trimmings and the wide belt course being white. This combination of work and coloring gives to the walls a massive effect. with a suggestion of rustic design. The

The main portion of the church is octagonal in form 58x58 ft. and its principal roof terminates at a clerestory, which is pierced by thirty-two small gothic windows, and above this is the clerestory roof which is also octagonal, and relieved by pediment windows. There are three sets of large cathedral triplet gothic windows, and small set of the same design, in the walls of the nave, which, with those of the clerestory, give an ample and soft light in

Luke. than meets the anticipations suggested by examination of the fine exterior .- Passing into the nave, or auditorium, from the main vestibule, the sight is most pleasing to the eye. The cathedral windows of hammered A. Gunn. glass and those of the clerestory-all in soft colors-blend their mellow light on blue-grey tinted walls, above which rises the main roof. This is divided into three hundred and thirty panels formed by diagonally placed wood in its natural colors. Provision is made for the addition of a gallery around six of the octagon sides 3 Tins Blueberries for should it ever become necessary, but its absence in no way mars the harmonious and pleasing effect of the interior.

Leading off from the main body of the church, and separated by a moving panelled partition of the full width of one of the octagon sides -23 feet-is the Sunday school room which is 33x55 feet and handsomely finished. It has a spacious assembly room and five class stalls, open in front and hav- 3 Tins Clams for ing dividing partitions between them which are on the alignment of the church platform. so that when the moving partition is raised those in the Sunday school rooms and those in the church may be addressed from the platform with equal facility. On the west side of the Sunday school room is that of the superintendent, with a movable wooden screen, which, when opened, places him in view of the scholars, so that he may address or direct them.

Next to the superintendent's room is that of the pastor, and there are private doors by which he and also members of the choir may reach their places without passing through the body of the church.

The main entrance to the Sunday school portion of the building is through the Cauard street door, which leads into a vestibule, from which, besides the door of the Sunday school room is one leading to the library and another to an inner vestibule where the mechanisms for operating the electric light and ventilating registers are

There are to be two furnaces in the base ment-one each for heating the church and Sunday school. Here also will be a kitchen,

lavatory and fuel room. The church was built from designs and specifications of Messrs. E liott & Hopson, architects, of Halifax. Mr. James Troy, of Newcastle, one of the most thorough master builder of the Province, was the contractor for the whole work, which he has personally superintended from the ground upwards. TUE The structure, throughout, is a credit to his mechanical skill and painstaking faithfulness

in executing the work.

The building of this church by St. John's congregation, which is not a very large one, is an illustration of what can be done under the impetus of zeal and enterprise in a good work. Too much cannot be said in praise of the energy, in tustry and self-denial which have characterised all concerned in the undertaking, from the pastor, Rev. J.
