Murder in St. John

James G. Oulton, a merely old St. John man, was supposed to always have considerable money on his person. On Wednesday evening of last week, Gillespie, who had been at work that day, went to the wretched quarters of the old man and soon after reported having found him dead. Investigation and a post mortem prove that he was murdered by blows from some pointed instrument, which made wounds in his temple and other parts of his head.

The Town Council met in special session on Friday evening, His Worship Mayor Snowball presiding. Town Clerk Gaynor read the returns of the late civic election, showing election by acclamation of the old board of aldermen, and of Mayor W. B. Snowball over Mr. W. C. Winslow by a vote of 380 to 307, giving Mr. Snowball a majority of 73 votes over Mr. Winslow.
