[Ca'ais correspondence of Bangor Commercial.]

Logie Co., Ltd , was landed at the factory on Friday and were immediately put into the boiler. The berries came from New Brunswick and were in excellent shape, Auother lot is expected from the eastern section of the province in a few days, and enough to keep the factory going steadily for the seas p is assured. Sufficient quantities of the fruit cannot be obtained in Washington county, at least at a figure which would admit of them being canned at a profit, and the bulk of the factory's supply will in all probab livy come from the other side of the line, which means increased revenue for the Calais customs house. The berries are being put up in gallou cans, not half gallons, as before incorrectly stated, and are intended principally for hotel and re-taurant use. Next season the firm will, in all probability, put up smaller cane for the general trade, as is done at their New Brunswick factories.




