Summer Excursions. CHANCES FOR AN OUTING ON THE RIVER VERY GOOD.

The Miramichi Steam Navigation Company is offering excellent facilities to its patrons for the enjoyment of river and seaside excursions. The new steamer, "Alexandra," which began to make down-river trips on Tuesday, is to call twice each week day at Burnt Church. This will give excursionists on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays opportunity to enjoy the fishing, bathing or other pastimes that well known resort for from four to five hours, and while the steamer is making the trip to Burnt Church and back. On Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, the time to be spent at Burnt Church will be from one and a half to two hours, and on these days excursionists to Bay du Vin will have three to four hours in which to enjoy the bathing, fishing, or willow rambling which that favorite resort offers. The fare for the round trip from Newcastle, Douglastown, Chatham or Loggieville is 35 cents, excepting on Saturdays, when it is 25 cents.

The "Alexandra" is licensed to carry 397 passengers, and there is room for promenade and dancing. An orchestra furnishes music on the trips of Tuesdays and Thursdays. Refreshments and regular meals are served on board.

Those who cannot avail themselves of the longer seaside trips from Chatham, may enjoy excursions arranged for on the steamer "Miramichi" to Newcastle, which costs only fifteen cents for the round trip on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays evenings. On Wednesday, commencing with the trip leaving Newcastle at 11.30, excursion rates to all points will be 15 cents. The excursion rates to Burnt Church and return on any afternoon will be 15 cents; children under sixteen, 10 cents.

Horse Show Features at the St. John Exhibition. Arrangements are now complete for an exhibit and display of horses at the St. John Exhibition, which will far surpass anything in this line attempted in the Maritime Provinces. An enthusiastic committee of horsemen has the matter in charge, and at a recent meeting outlined the following programme:

Now, every day school district in the parish has its Sunday school and there are many things encouraging. The Conference on Grading was conducted by Mr. Theobald Clarke. It was very interesting, presenting a fine illustration that these workers know how to question on a subject for which they hunger for knowledge to apply to their own schools. The evening session consisted of addresses by Rev. J. Eusey on sympathy which the school needs from the home. Rev. Mr. Thorpe, of Nova Scotia, visiting here, gave a short but unique address on the importance of the work for which we are met. And the Field Secretary took a wide sweep of history, progress, principles, and outlook of the work. Many notes of progress were cited from the recent International convention.

The Bible reading which opened the second morning session was of a strong educational character on the child school, etc., and followed by conferences on the Home Departmental work. That of the Home Department led by Miss McNaughton was more than ordinary in force of instruction. Literature was distributed by the Field Secretary to young delegates that they might go back and work out these lessons in their schools.

This was followed by the report of county secretary, Miss Helen McLoon. This report indicated much faithful service. Her fellow-officers evidently appreciated such a report. In the last session Rev. C. U. Palmer gave an address on encouragement to T. teachers. The nominating committee reported and after the election of officers, Mr. M. A. Kelly was introduced and said a few words about the work. Miss Barry took her place as Recording Secretary.

A conference on Primary Work was opened with the formation of a county primary union. Committees reported, a few closing words were said, hymns sung and Mr. Palmer closed the closing prayer.
