

Resolution was passed ; - "That Halifax being the most eastern port that can be reached by a route involving no more risk of detention by ice or fog than those followed by the fastest steamers plying between Europe and New York, which is exceedingly easy of success, has the strongest claim to be chosen as the western terminus of the proposed fast line."

Mr. Arnold Foster, financial secretary in the admiralty, was the guest of honor on Friday night at the Conservative Cinb's dinner at Liverpool. In an address, in which he outlined the admiralty's pro gramme, Mr. Arnold-Foster said he regarded the agreement between the government value received for protection in time of war, and that the proposed Cunard steamers were intended to possess special qualities no obtainable on a purely commercial basis of agreement. Mr. Arnold-Foster said the admiralty is at present extending the principle of employing private enterprise in shipbuilding, the designs of four new "scouts" having been furnished by the contractors themselves. Every big gun of any make on the new vessels is to be interchangeable in all its parts. Fifty-seven ships which are not considered effective are to be stricken from the navy list, and the armaments of some existing ships are to be doubled. The construction of submarine vessels is to be taken up with energy. The most powerful squadron of cruisers which has ever sailed the seas is about to be commissioned, said Mr. Arnold-Foster, and even in the absence of the channel fleet Freat Britain would have powerful protec-
