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NEWS AND NOTES.

The smallest outbreak in Montreal has cost the city \$33,000.

Nearly 3,000 troops are encamped in the anthracite coal mining regions of Pennsylvania.

Earthquake shocks in Russian Turkestan have wiped out many villages and caused terrible loss of life.

Four thousand tons of Welsh anthracite coal reached New York, last week.

A meeting of Canadian Archbishops was held in Ottawa yesterday to confer with Mr. Falconio, on affairs respecting the Roman Catholic Church in the Dominion.

Seventeen out of the twenty-eight Metropolitan boroughs in London, have either installed electric light plants or made arrangements for introducing them as municipal or borough work.

The Rand Daily Mail appeared at Johannesburg on Monday last week for the first time.

The Premier of Queensland is quoted as saying that the colony is dissatisfied with the results of confederation, and may secede.

The London 'Chronicle' of last Thursday stated that a movement is afoot to create Premier Roosevelt's honorary colonel-in-chief of one of the British line regiments, a position similar to that held by the Emperor William in the British army and King Edward in the German army.

Clergymen will please ask for Standard certificate instead of using their usual permit.

ENTERTAINMENT OF DELEGATES. All delegates' names should be sent to Mr. Alex. Watson, King street, St. John, full six days before the opening of convention on October 14th.

Then a card will probably be sent to each, stating with whom they are to find a name.

If a name be sent by county officer, by a superintendent or secretary, and afterwards that person cannot go, be sure to notify Mr. Watson quickly, stating the name of the substitute, or whether no substitute.

Do not omit titles (Mr., Mrs. or Miss). Make the way plain both for your delegate and their hosts.

Last year some delegates felt ashamed because their names had not been sent; superintendent or secretary, or "someone" had handed. Do not treat any delegate so this year.

Do not send the name of anyone who cannot go.

If a delegate intends to stay with friends, please state the name and address of your friend, so the committee can place you in their books, and not send others in your place.

Every delegate should send their name. If they expect to stay with friends, or provide their own hotel, state that hotel. The committee likes to know where each delegate can be found, for mail, telegrams, etc.

On arrival, by either boat or train, go once to Garman Street Church, which stands with face on Garman street and side on Queen street.

Electric cars pass the front of station, and will take you along Prince William street to the foot of Queen street, only about two minutes walk from the church. Enter the basement school from Queen street, register, receive your badge, and a convention page will direct you to your home.

Appoint your delegate quickly. Send their names at once to Mr. Alex. Watson, King street, St. John.

Governor Snowball in Carleton County.

The Carleton Sentinel says that His Honor Lieutenant Governor Snowball made a pleasing and practical speech in opening the exhibition at Woodstock on Wednesday last week.

He began by saying that this was the first time he had ever visited Carleton County. The scenery he had already seen was certainly such as to inspire one. As an agricultural county, Carleton claimed to take first place, and no doubt deserved that honor.

He hoped he was speaking to farmers as it was to them he wished to address his remarks. In many ways the province of New Brunswick had great advantages over the more western parts of the Dominion. He found on reference to statistics that one third of the oats raised in New Brunswick, were raised in this county.

That was good, because this county was not making the progress in raising wheat that it should. He thought this was a mistake, and he could speak with experience as he was a farmer himself. From the Province \$7000 was sent out a day to buy flour, and statistics showed that Carleton sent away on an average, every day, \$690 to purchase flour. He thought also that this county should do more in raising fruit. Proceeding the Governor spoke of the mistake in his judgment of farmers raising trotting horses and Jersey cattle, and urged the farmers of Carleton county to go in for more profitable stock.
