New Use for Refined Paraffine Wax.

A new and important use for R fin Par ffine Wax seems to have been discovered by a prominent resident of Ohio, living near Laucaster, who had two trees bad damaged by storm, one being a maple and the other an apple. In each case a large limb was broken down from the trunk, but ! still attached to it. The limbs were propped up and fastened securely with straps, very much as a boken leg might b fastened with spints, and then melted refined wax poured into and over all the cracks. The "surgical operation" was entirely successful. The Paraffine prevented the escape of the sap, kept out the rain and moisture which would have rotted the trees, prevented the depredations of insects, and the limbs seem thus tar to be perfectly re-attached to the tree


