

Chatham Town Council met in regular monthly session at the Town Hall on Monday evening, His Worship Mayor Snowball.

After reading and confirmation of minutes The Mayor read a communication from Geo. Porteous of Guelph. applying for the position of manager of a furniture factory which he had heard was to be established in Chatham

Killed by Newspaper Stander. A despatch of last Thursday from Rome

"An inquiry instituted into the scandals egarding the late Herr Krupp at Capri Island is said to have completely cleared the deceased's character, and it has been decided that the government will prosecute the newspapers which made the defamatory statement. It is stated that the accusations against Herr Krupp have been traced to a German painter resident in Capri, whose arrest was ordered, and he disappeared.


