Sailor Gets Verlict of \$4.000. Judge Hanford awarded Albert Louie, sailor of the ship, Troop, of Sc. John, \$4,000 damages against that vessel because Captain operation, thereby, according to the finding of the court, acting to a most brutal manner, and giving a striking example of man's inhumanity to man. Louie fell from the main upper topsail yard to the deck fracturing the bones of his left arm and right thigh. It is stated that at Port Townsend marine hospital it was necessary to perform a very severe operation on Louis to undo the mischief caused by the captain's clumsy work. As a result, he can never again perform the duties of an able seaman, and is deprived of his means of livelihood.

Dr. McDonald, of Haves, secretary, of the Northumberland County Board of Health, They found that although the Whites were supposed to have been quarantined for a week or more, a member of the family had been at Rogersvil e station on Saturday and neighbors who had visited the house had been going about the community. They made thorough enquiries, Dr. McDonald acting for provincial authorities, investigating those the county of Ke .t, the infected district being intersected by the county line. At latest advices, eight families were placed under quarantine. After consultation with Rev. Father Richard and other prominent people, it was decided best, as a precautionary step, to close the church and schools.
