This is exclusive of third and fourth class matter. There was an increase of eleven and a half per cent. in the number of letters carried.

The increase of postal matter in the last thirty years is shown by a statement which gives the number of letters carried in 1876 as forty-one millions; in 1886 seventy-one millions, and in 1896 as one hundred and sixteen millions. Of the letters posted this year 105,605,000 were in Ontario and 46 200,000 in Quebec.

There was a growth of seven and seventenths per cent. in the sales of postage stamps. The postal note business developed in the twelve months to the extent of \$243 454, and the money order business by \$5,593,144, the greatest gain in the history of the department. The reduction of the money order rate between Canada and the United S: ates has resulted in a large increase.
