#### The Colonial Conference.

The Blue Book on the Coloural Conference does not add much to what is a ready known. The resolution on the subject of preferential trade is the most interesting part of the report. In that resolution the conference recognizes that preferential trade between the Uarsed Kingdom and the colonies would stimulate and facilitate commerce, and strengthen the Empire: that eral system of free trad ; that with a vew. however, to promoting an increase of trade within the Enpire it is desirable that those colonies which have not already adopted such a policy should, as far as their circum stances permit, give substantial treatment of the products and manufactures of the United Kingdom. Four Premiers urged an Imperial grant to the colonial products and manufactures, giving preferential treatment in the reduction of duties. Five Premiers present at the conference undertake to submit to their respective governments at the earliest opportunity a request that such measures btaken as may be necessary to give effect to the principle of this resolution.

A memorandum from the president of Board of Trade shows that the premiers were prepared to recommend preferential treatment on British goods as follows

Canada, the existing preference of 331 per cent, and an additional preference on selected articles by reducing the duties in favor of the United Kingdom, raising the duties on foreign imports and placing duties on certain foreign imports now free. New Zealand, ten percent all round reduc-

tion on present duties on British goods. Cape Colony and Natal, 25 percent preference on British goods.

Australia was not in a position to defin the extent of the preference to be given. The radical attitude of the Canadian ministers in favor of preferential trade was shown throughout the conference. The Canadians definitely urged upon the Colonial Secretary, Mr. Chamberlain, that in consideration of the substantial preferences given by Canada to the products of Great Britain, Canadian exports of food products ought to be exempted from the duties imposed this year by Great Britain. Mr. Chamberlain did not agree to this proposal. He said he did not believe that there would follow any material result to the trade of the United Kingdom on account of the granting of preferential trade by Canada, great as the Canadian ministers claimed this trade to be. and he declined to agree to such a departure

from the fiscal policy of the Empire. Another resolution emphasizes the desirability of considering the refusal of the privileges of the coasting trade, including trade between the United Kingdom and the colonies, and between the colonies and countries wherein corresponding trade is carried in ships of their own nationality.

## Agricultural Show in Britain.

A private letter from Mr. W. A. Mac Kinnon, Chief of the Fruit Division, Dominion Dept. of Agriculture, who now in Great Bitain, contains some interesting notes on the development o Agricultural Shows in that country. Some of his criticisms given herewith are well worthy of notice by those interested n Agricultural Education in Canada.

"One striking feature of the recent all but two or three of the buildings were simply frames covered with canvas, in The blue book shows also that owing to other words the Show took place under this system is that the framework can be taken down, and the tents shipped from point to point, and used many times in the season. This arrangement also makes it possible to use grounds for an exhibiion which are required during the rest of the year for another purpose.

The tents are arranged in a compact and systematic order in such a way that visitors can go in one direction and return in another, seeing always new exhibits. The classes are arranged in blocks, not in



In the catalogues and prize lists judges a e warned not to be influenced by the market value of stock in making their awards, and a high official stated that in his opinion too little attention was paid to the economic value of the exhibits, and that farmers are sometimes misled by awa de so as to produce an article which is not remunerative.

With regard to the Smithfield Show

they have began to make improvements in the direction of market demand : that is to be expected as the object of the show is to encourage the production of butcher's meat. Formerly prizes were given for animals four years old, but lately this has been cut down to three and under and no prizes are given for cows. The result is that they get fewer of the "callow" animals which used to be seen there: yet they still give awards in some cases to animals which would not h sought for by a butcher.

The Smithfield judges are breeders, and the lessons learned by farmers from the judgment have to be picked up without the benefit of any explanation of reasons from the judges. Farmers are supposed of animals can be made to put on flesh at

There is also a slaughter class which the judges view and rank alive and afterwards when killed. The secretary says that the average result is that the same animals are ranked first both alive and dead, but there are exceptions and some dissatisfaction in consequence. In this class one judge is usually a farmer and the other a butcher; these have similar ideas for the block test. Heifers must be killed if they take a prize, this being meat show, and not a general or agricultural show.

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
