I., where she is high up, having only six feet of water at high tide. The steamer Frank C. Burt went to her assistance Saturday night, 13th, and returned to Summerside Sunday, leaving her as she was.

The underwriters at St. John were advised to the effect that the Harry Knowlton would probably be floated. Mr. J. A. Gregory, who was at the scene of the grounding, reported three tugs engaged from Charlottetown. The schooner was resting on a rock and was uninjured.

Mr. John Kilburn returned last night from the scene of his extensive lumbering operations at the head waters of the St. John river. Mr. Kilburn led the woods on Tuesday up to which time there had been no snow and very little frost. The men and teams in the woods are working under difficulties and at disadvantages owing to the wet weather and the great abundance of rain. The lowlands are very soft and muddy and a great deal of bridging and making roads has to be done, which would be unnecessary if the ground was frozen. The open areas into the woods this fall with the intention and with prospects of getting out an unusually large lot. It is weather conditions improve it is most likely that the biggest cut for many years will be brought out of the woods next spring, notwithstanding the fact that the fall has been so unfavorable. Lumber is not as high as it used to be, but is coming more than usual to get it out, and the operators will necessarily demand a good price for their output. Wages are \$6 higher per man by the month than last year, and all provisions cost more. Men have been very scarce and it has been difficult to obtain crews for the woods. -Gleaner.

The World's Slander of Sportsmen and Game Wardens. The World endeavours to wrangle out of the false position in which it placed itself by making certain scandalous and unfounded statements affecting the character of the sportsmen who visit New Brunswick. These were broadcast over the country and have been copied in papers elsewhere. Those who are best informed on the subject know their untruthful character. Such of the statements as could be tested by the World, for instance, stated that the non-resident license fee was \$20. That was shown to be untrue as it is \$30. It also stated that the license for killing moose in some of the States was \$100. It was shown that not one half of that sum was charged for such a license in any state in the Union. It was evident that the World article, from beginning to end, was designedly untruthful, for the purpose of misleading and creating a false impression on the public mind.

Now, the World attempts to break the force of its own exposure by offering to whisper somebody's name in the ear of Warden Robinson as authority for its malicious statements. As it made these statements which are publicly challenged, its duty is to either withdraw them or let the public know who its informant is, so that the people of the country may have an idea of the value of its testimony. We presume that the World's informant is some person who has, perhaps, himself been detected in law-breaking, and has made use of that slander-willing paper to spread the idea that all visiting hunters are of his own class.

Unless the World gives the names of the hunters who are the subject of its slanders, it is in a bad way. The regular annual meeting of the Chatham Curling Club was held at the rink on Monday evening, president W. B. Snowball in the chair. The minute and account books, secretary-treasurer R. A. Logie's financial report and that of auditors W. M. MacLachlan and Jas. Nicol thereon, were all read and finally adopted and there was a sanguine balance to the credit of the club on last year's operations.

President Snowball made a brief address, in which he referred to his two years' tenure of the office and thought that he might well give place to someone else, as the honor was one which could be worthily bestowed on some other member who had done good service to the organization. In reference to the play for club trophies, which the secretary's report showed had not been completed last season, it might be desirable to refer the subject to a committee so that by some such means as offering two or three prizes in each of several matches, there could be played for all the trophies during the winter. He spoke in warm terms of the courtesy and efficiency with which Secretary

Logie performed his duties and said that whatever changes might be made none could advantageously take place in that office. There was a general wish that Mr. Snowball should continue in office as president and he was unanimously re-elected, as were also Mr. Geo. Hildebrand as vice president and R. A. Logie as secretary-treasurer. The election of chaplain was deferred. Messrs. S. D. Heckbert, C. P. Hickey and Edw. Johnson, with the officers already chosen, were elected as members of the Managing Committee. New members were elected as follows: Geo. A. Day, G. Stead, W. H. Tapper, Fred. A. Dyke, Fred. H. Gibson, Chas. Robinson, Gordon Logie, Edwin Ruddock. Mr. James Neilson was unanimously elected an honorary member of the club. The membership fee was continued at \$5 and the bye law relating thereto so changed as to make the time of payment Dec. 1st, instead of July, 1st as heretofore.
