THE "URANIA" LEAVES PORT :- The steamer" Urania" which was caught in the early formed ice of the Miramichi nearly a mile below the Chatham wharves, worked her way out on Friday and Saturday last. The idea of rigging two heavy bawks of birch over the bows and by raising them with the steam winches and letting them drop, breaking the ice, was suggested by Mr. Peter Tarner who had seen vessels moved through ice in North China by that means. This was doue under direction of Mr. Richard Walker, and worked admirably, the result being that the vessel worked along slowly, self-propelled and went over down. the bar on Sunday. It is intimated that the captain of the "Urania" acted as if it was a matter of indifference to him whether the vessel got out of port or not.


