The Miramichi Pulp Mill. The report of the directors of the St. John Sulphite Pulp Company, Limited, (Miramichi) for the year ended May 31st, 1903, states:

"From the combined balance sheet, prepared by Messrs. Chibine and Tait, it will be observed that there has been a loss on the year's working of \$5,636 34. 61, and that after adding the debit balance as at May 31st, 1902, of \$1,189 10. 54, there is a balance of \$6,825 15. 14, as the debit of profit and loss."

A committee was appointed to nominate officers for the current year. Messrs. Geo. E. Fisher Secretary-Treasurer, who had served in that capacity for three or four years, and Geo. F. Searle, who had served as president for about fifteen years expressed their desire to be retired.

The committees having retired, they reported back, recommending the appointment of the following: Geo. J. Dickson, President. John O'Brien, 1st Vice do. Wm. Kerr, 2nd do. Geo. E. Fisher, Secy. Treas.

The report was unanimously adopted. Vice president Kerr brought up the subject of heavy horses and thought the Society ought to obtain one for service in the district next season.

Mr. Searle thought the matter an important one, but said the experience had been that the majority of the farmers did not by their actions show that they appreciated the difference between pure bred and mongrel sires. The Society had owned and housed some of the best horses imported into the province, but their progress, which were only mongrels, were patrolled in many cases, in preference to them because they were cheaper.

Messrs. R. Flanagan, John O'Brien, Geo. Dickson, T. W. Platt and others favored Mr. Kerr's views. Mr. Platt said that the farmer who raised a good horse of the extra heavy class from a pure bred sire could get \$200 or \$250 for it, while if he raised a 1000 or 1100 horse he couldn't get more than \$100 for it, and yet it cost no more to raise the large horse than the small one.

The matter of the Society giving a bonus to a pure bred heavy horse was brought up by Mr. R. A. Snowball and discussed by Messrs. R. Murray, John Dickson, Geo. P. Searle, and it was ordered, on motion of Mr. Murray, that the matter be dealt with by the new board as circumstances might warrant.

It was ordered that the usual subscription of \$5 be made by the Society to the Fat Stock Show in Amherst, N. S. On motion of Mr. M. F. Noonan a vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring president, Mr. Geo. F. Searle, for the long and efficient services he had given to the Society as its head, and Mr. D. G. Smith, who seconded the resolution, spoke in warm appreciation of Mr. Searle's connection with and work in the Society's interests.

Mr. Searle made an appropriate acknowledgment, after which the meeting adjourned. The Recent I. C. R. Wreck. A PASSENGER TELLS OF THE ACCIDENT AT LOBBINSIERE.
