A Peculiar Fatality.

Last Friday at Budgetown, New Jersey, one man was killed and two others seriously injured that there is very slight chance of their recovery, by the bursting of a separator bowl in a milk plant. The bowl, which was made of steel and copper, burst by reason of the force of centrifugal motion, just as an exploding fly wheel does, and the pieces were hurled in all directions. Some of them flew into other departments of the plant, causing considerable damage, especially to the ice-making machinery. The walls of the building were riddled as if by shot from cannon. 
