A Long Voyage in a Small Craft.

A venturesome old salt living in New Zaland has built a yawl, intending to sail in her with one other hand to London, via Cape Horn, and afterward to the St. Louis exhibi-

The boat is much after the style of a ship's lifeboat, with more rise of floor and freeboard, and with a keel running from nothing forward to close on 2it, at the heel. The boat is built of kauri, with three . kins-two diagonal and the third and outer fore and aft. Her dimensions are: Length, over all, 22ft ; beam, 6ft. 6in.; draft, 3.t. 6in. Bal consists of 4:wt. of shingle inside and 71 cwt. of lead on the keel, but she hae also four tanks, holding 128 gallons of fresh water, placed low down on the keel, and i is the intention, as these are emptied, to refill with the briny. She has a small raised cabin top with sliding companion and a water tight self-draining cockpit lined with zinc. A pipe with stopcock connects this cockpit with the tanks, so that by shutting a solid sheet of hard, treacherous ice, so that off drain pipes any fresh water caught in the cockpit during a heavy rain can be run into Monday, Mr. Alex. 

Colouel Call was a Past Master of North umberland Lodge, F. & A. M. and a member. of the Northumberland Highland Society. Since April 1897 he was sheriff of North umberland county. He had also teen on the staff of Lieut, Governor Snowball as A. D.C. since that gentleman's appointment. He travelled considerably in Europe and in Canada, and was widely known. In religion he was a Presbyterian and had been trustee. secretary and treasurer of S. James' Church, Newcastle, for a good many years. On May 21st, 1862, he married Annie Rakine Nevin, of Stonehaven, Kincardineshire. Scotland, who, with their son, Byren, and daughter, Laura (Mrs. E. T. Jones, of Denver.) survive him."

The funeral took place last Saturday afternoon, at 2.30. It is seldom that so large a number of men, representing all classes of the people, from the Governor of the Province to the hamblest citizen, assemble to participate in the last sad rites on such au occasion. Some of those who had been Mr. other organizations were desirous that he should be buried with the observances and henors which sometimes characterise the funerals of their comrades, but the family. while appreciating the regard for deceased which the suggestions of a military and masonic funeral betokened, preferred that the obsequies should be as quiet. possible and actended only by those who wished to honor his memory as a friend and fellow citizen. When the time set for the funeral arrived, the crowd in attendance was a very large one, number ng more than thousand. There were hundreds from out side places, all the North Shore counties. as well as V. estmorland, St. John, Kings and others being represented.

The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. Mr. Arnott, pastor of St James' Presbyterian church, and its late pastor, Rev. Wm. Aitken. The pall-bearers were Messrs. John C. Miller, Jas. Robinson. W. A. Park, Ernest Hutchison, J. D. Creagnan and Wm. Irving. In the funeral procession, the clergy and members and officials of the Town Councils of Newcastle and Chatham precoded the hearse.
